



Montreat Praises Fire Fighters In Dorm Demolition

Montreat college's appreciation to men and boys of the community "beyond the call of duty" was expressed this week on behalf of the college by the business manager, Harry K. McDonnald, for the part they played in fighting the fire which destroyed College hall, a girls' dormitory, last Saturday night.

By Monday of this week the 70 girls previously housed in the building had taken up residence in Fellowship hall after having stayed at Assembly inn during the weekend following the frie.

Appreciation was also expressed by the college for the response of the community in gifts by local merchants and residents to meet clothing needs of the students. Nearly all of their possessions were lost in the fire. The Red Cross, merchants and local people came quickly to their aid, the college reported.

Damage to the dormitory, which represented a "total loss," it was reported, was estimated as between \$200,000 and \$250,000. Only the stone exterior of the building remained. The building was insured, the report said.

Appreciation was also expressed for the work of the local fire department and to those from Asheville and the two nearby hospitals. They stood by until the early hours of the morning, after battling the blaze for more than two hours. To these efforts was attributed the failure of the fire to spread to nearby buildings. The fire reportedly started at the base of a chimney on the roof of College hall and burned downward. At the time, the majority of the young women occupants, 55 out of 70 residents, were attending a basketball game in the gymnasium or were out with friends. All 15 in the dormitory at the time of outbreak of the fire escaped to safety. Some were able to toss a few personal possessions out of windows of the burning building, but most of the girls lost all of their belongings. A small quantity of furniture from a reception


