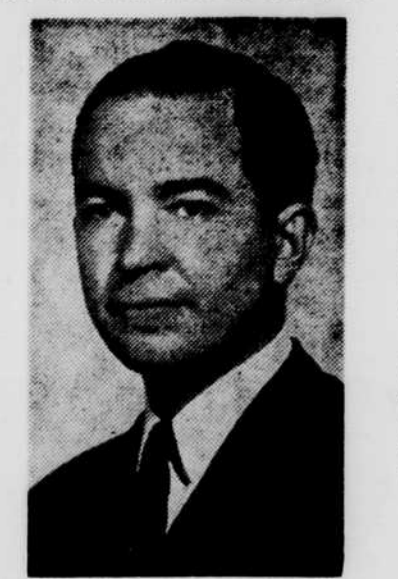

MARS HILL COLLEGE MARKS 100th YEAR

MARS HILL—Feb. 16 marked the 100th anniversary of the chartering of Mars Hill college by the North Carolina General assembly and the centennial birthday of the present name of the Baptist junior college. On Feb. 16, 1859, "an act to incorporate the trustees of Mars Hill college in the County of Madison" was ratified by the General assembly. The college, which in reality was only a school, had been founded three years earlier under the name "The French Broad Baptist Institute," taking its name from the Baptist association in which it is located and which fostered its birth. The college, which had only a few local children as students during the early days, is now the largest junior college in the Southern Baptist convention with an annual enrollment of approximately 1,000. These come from almost every county in North Carolina, from 21 other states and the District of Columbia and from six foreign countries.

SPOTLIGHT ON FRANKS
Tuck a hot, juicy frankfurter into a bun, add mustard, onion, and pickle relish, and m-m-m-m!—one bite will convince you why franks have become an American institution. Today the perennial "hot dog" is being challenged by innumerable other frankfurter favorites. Homemakers have learned that this well seasoned sausage fits into main dishes, salads and snacks with amazing versatility. A pound of franks on hand in the refrigerator assures you of quick, convenient eating—easy on the budget because there is absolutely no waste. Already thoroughly cooked by steam and smoked over hardwood fires, franks need only to be reheated. Simplest way is to place them in boiling water to cover, remove pan from heat, cover with a lid and let stand for 7 to 8 minutes. Or steam franks gently for about 7 minutes in covered saucepan containing boiling water to depth of 1/4 inch. When cooking franks over an outdoor grill, remember that "easy does it." Guard against intense heat that will make the franks split and allow the juices to escape. Turn the franks frequently for even heating and browning. Meaty, rich-flavored frankfurters combine well with potatoes, macaroni, rice, vegetables and breads. And a leftover frank or two, sliced and scrambled with eggs, or added to hot soup, makes

a quick and nutritious lunch or supper. Or, since the franks are already cooked, use them sliced or chopped in salads or sandwich fillings. However you serve franks, whenever you serve them, you'll be sure to win the family's hearty approval!

DYE STUFF
With a package of dye, you can refurbish a trinket, create a new effect, or just have fun. Have you tried:
Giving your old yellowed fake pearls a new lease on life? Dunk them in cobalt blue or hot pink.
Tinting fresh flowers in a cool dye solution? Just swish carnations, daisies or dried seed pods and grasses in the color effect you want.
Reviving shantung or rayon or white straw shoes by brushing a strong solution of dye on them? Use a narrow new paint brush and work quickly, having previously dry-cleaned the shoes.
Changing the color of a fabric lampshade? Tie a cord on the center of the framework and dip shade in and out of warm solution. Hang up on shower rod or clothesline to dry.
Dyeing turkey or chicken feathers in wild colors for an Indian headdress for your small fry?
Dyeing a faded transparent plastic raincoat? Clean ones work best, but interesting effects can be achieved with already tinted ones.
