Geologist positions will be filled various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and throughout the country. To qualify for most positions, applicants must have had appropriate education and experence. Applications must be filed with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Geological Survey, Washington 25, D. C.

Patent Adviser positions may be filled in various Federal agencies n the Washington, D. C., area, but most of the positions are in the Department of the Navy.


