Yewitt Elliott is doing some carpenter work for Mr. and Mrs. James Davis on upper Cedar Creek.

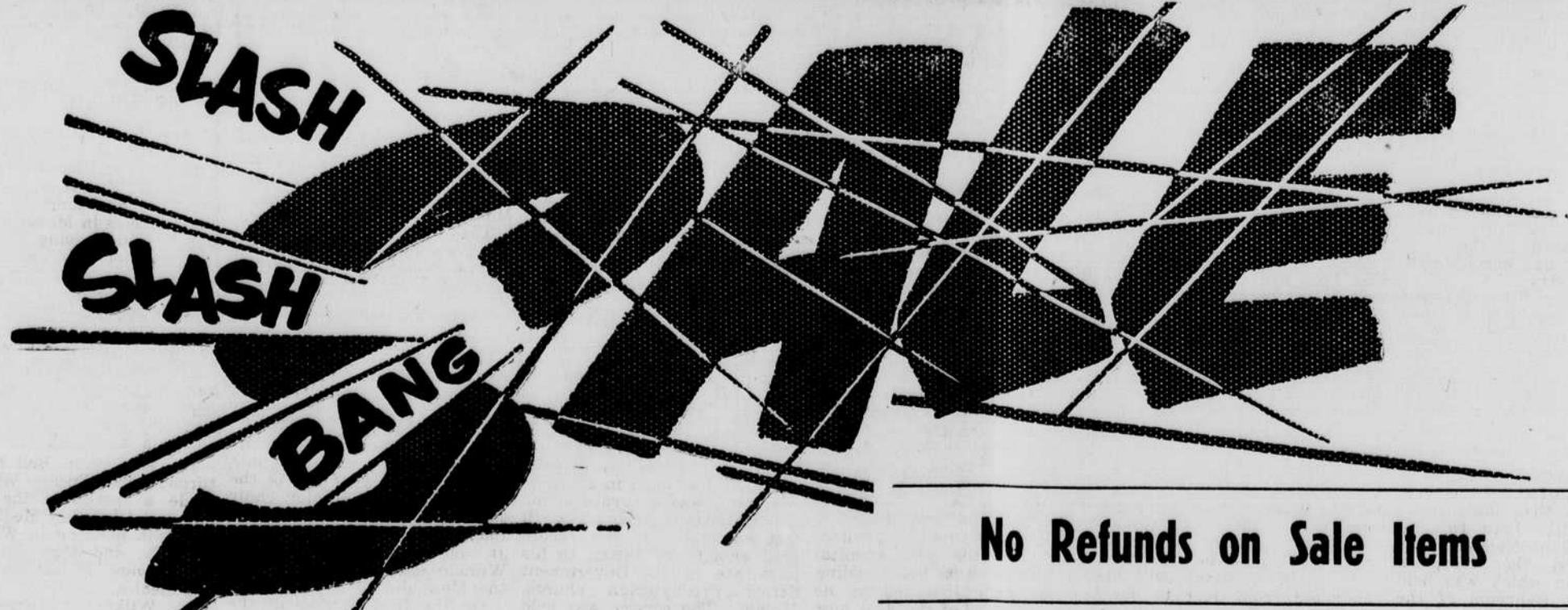
Mrs. Eula Mae Morris and sons Gerald, Taylor, and David, left Christmas Day for a two weeks' stay in Florida.
