Although chief local attention was focused on the race in the 12th congressional district where three hopefuls are staging a lively fight for the job, and in the legislative field, the four Democratic candidates for governor have been crossing and criss-crossing the state as they put the final touches on what each hopes will bring him out on top come Saturday.

In the 12th district Roy A. Taylor of Black Mountain, Shelby Horton of Asheville, and Thad Bryson of Bryson City are the contestants.

Voters in this race will have an opportunity to vote twice at the same time. One for the short term to fill the unexpired term of Congressman Hall who died last year, and the other for the full term. It will be necessary to vote for both terms.

Herschel Harkins, Asheville attorney and businessman, seeks the state senate seat now held by James G. Stikeleather.
