

Western North Carolina Outlet For American Broadcasting Co.

Work on the studios and transmitter of Black Mountain's new radio station, WBMT, is nearing completion and testing of the equipment should begin within the next few days, Eugene Slatkin, general manager, told the News by telephone this morning.

Radio Center is located just off U.S. Highway 70, between the two Black Mountain schools, on the old Blade property which faces Charlotte street.

The tower has been completed for several days and residents have expressed great interest in the lights which serve to warn aircraft of the presence of the structure and to act as a marker at night for aircraft.



The tower is 155 feet high. Studios, located alongside the tower, are in a new building 46 feet by 24 feet. It is composed of studios A and B, control room, transmitter room, two offices, reception room, rest rooms, and special room for the Associated Press Teletype News Service. 
