What's Goin' At Owen

Besides our nine new teachers and a whole new freshman class, there are many other changes here at Owen. The biggest change is in the time schedule. The activity period has been entirely eliminated to encourage extra-curricular activities being carried out after school. This makes available more time for actual school work. As of now the first three class periods are 60 minutes long and the last two 85 minutes long. The fourth period will remain 85 minutes long all year, since the lunch schedule necessitates that this class period be split. An 85 minute split period is about twice as effective as a 60 minute split period. The other 85 minute period will be rotated, i. e. the first, second, third, and fifth periods will take turns being 85 minutes long. This will teach techniques for teaching longer periods. Research has shown that more work is accomplished in one 85 minute period than in two 45 minute periods under the same teacher.

The elimination of all study halls has released the teachers to teach five full periods of subject matter each. This has allowed the curriculum to be expanded to include the following: Spanish I, Latin III, College Algebra (Algebra III), Business English, and additional sections in many other subjects. Because there are no study halls, all students are required to take five subjects, allowing them to graduate with 20 credits.

Much new equipment has been added which make both studying and teaching easier. Some of it is as follows: two new tape recorders, apparatus for demonstrating mathematical principles, two new movie projectors, five compound microscopes, one dissecting scope, and other devices to demonstrate scientific principles and to carry out experiments.
