### Countwide Dog Clinics Start

Health officials announced that 64 dog vaccination clinics will be held in the City of Asheville and throughout Buncombe county starting March 14, 1961.

Every person owning a dog four months of age or older is required to have their dog or pet vaccinated against rabies during the vaccination clinic time. A dog owner can bring a dog to the clinic or to his own personal veterinarian. This is a requirement of the North Carolina State General Assembly and is the law of our state. Other requirements are that every dog shall wear a dog rabies tag on his collar at all times. Health authorities advise animal lovers not only to identify their dog with a collar and name plate and address, but also to be sure that the dog rabies tag is attached. Requirements of the N. C. State Rabies Dog Law makes a dog liable for impoundment in the animal shelter by the dog warden if such dog does not wear a rabies tag. All animals found without a rabies tag will be confined to the animal shelter. Dr. H. W. Stevens, Buncombe County Health Director, stated:

Stray or unwanted dogs or other pets will be picked up by representatives of the Animal Shelter on request.

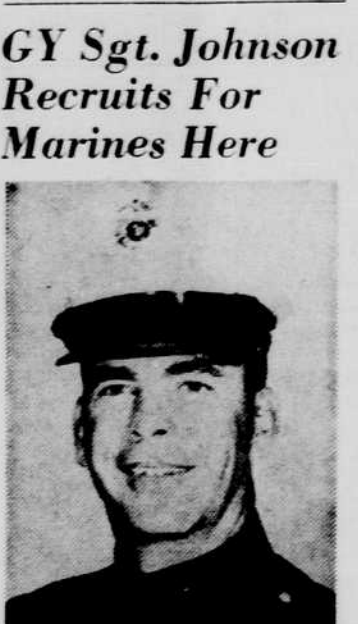
