News of the historic event came from I. R. Wittuhn, President of Kiwanis International. The service organization's headquarters are in Chicago at the Kiwanis International Building, 101 East Erie Street.


In accordance with Kiwanis policy, the new club of Tijuana was sponsored by, and assisted in its organization

by neighboring Kiwanis clubs: The Kiwanis Club of San Diego and the Kiwanis Club of Chula Vista, California.

Seventy-one charter members made up this first Kiwanis Club in Mexico. Senor Benjamin Garcia Montiel, an official of Agua Caliente Race Course, is the president of the club.

A large delegation of Kiwanians from the San Diego area crossed the border into Tijuana tonight for the permanent organization meeting. Formal charter presentation took place on May 15.
