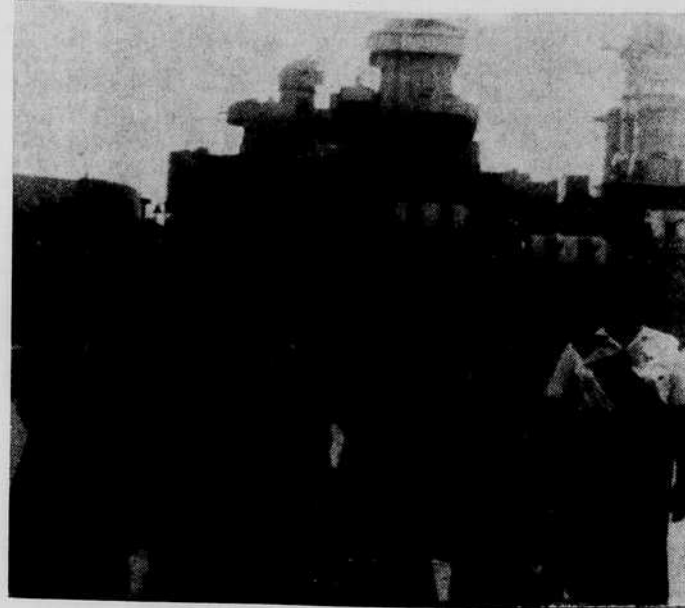
### PUBLIC HEALTH MEETING

## Two Negro Boys Drown In Lake

Howard Ervin Harris, Jr., and Ernest Grier, Jr., 8 year old colored boys were drowned in the lake adjacent to the Dorothy Wall Camp on the Cragmont Road.

The boys were among several who had come up for the day with their pastor from Clinton Tabernacle, Hickory.

The accident occurred around 4 Sunday afternoon when six persons were in a boat which overturned. The bodies of the two disappeared and were recovered, one around 6, the other not until 9. Rescue squads from Black Mountain, Skyland and Swannanoa Fire Departments and police from Black Mountain and Swannanoa assisted the investigating officers Joe Hemphill and James Hall.

The young man in charge of the recreation program for the summer kept the other 4 afloat by hanging onto the boat until transferred to another.

Dr. John C. Young, Buncombe county coroner, ruled the deaths accidental.

## Music Center Gives Second Local Concert

Concert goes in Montreat Saturday night will not only hear two of the nation's most celebrated artists, but will also hear the world premiere of a composition by one of them.

The Transylvania Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Dr. James Christian Pfohl, will play three numbers, Overture to "Egmont" by Beethoven, "Till Eulenspiegel" by Richard Strauss, and "Romeo and Juliet Overture-Fantasy" by Tchaikovsky.

J. B. Clark, the State Dept. Service Office of the American Legion, threw a challenge to veterans of W. W. II and Korea in an address before a joint meeting of the Waycaster-McFee Post 129 and the Auxiliary at the Black Mountain Club House last night.

"It is later than you think and the benefits obtained for you by W. W. I veterans through the American Legion are gradually being whittled away because of your inactivity," Clark said before installing the new officers of the two local units. "While you were still in the service of your country these W. W. I veterans were securing legislation which made your return to civil life through G. I. training, G. I. loans, hospitalization and other benefits so much easier than they found upon their return from W. W. I. You are taking these advantages for granted without thought of what you owe to these older men who are now our fathers and grandfathers," he said. "And remember they received nothing for themselves. The least you can do is to join the Legion, pay the five dollars membership fee and carry on the work they started for you."
