The importance of person-to-person contact between people of the United States and those in South American countries cannot be too strongly emphasized, Simon Berggrun, a former resident of Argentina for many years and now of Asheville, told members and guests of the Tea and Topic Club at their literary meeting Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Don Wright. "Needs of the masses are not being met by the foreign aid program, but could be helped if individuals and churches would do more to show friendship. Writing personal letters to South American residents, supporting the exchange student program, adopting an orphan-or "brother" from one or more of the countries, are among ways of promoting friendship. The speaker also emphasized the importance of learning the Spanish language as early as possible.

Mr. Berggrun stated that it is very possible that within five years communism will be in control of most of South America just as it is in Cuba.
