Europeans To Get Eye Full In North Carolina
Three things that are scarce in Europe but abundant in North Carolina are target of travel executives from nine European countries touring major North Carolina vacation attractions this week.
Indians, deep sea fishing and golf were the three things Europeans told the North Carolina Travel Mission to Europe last winter that they most wanted to see on their return visit.
On Sunday, October 7, about 25 travel executives and tour operators from England, France, Germany, Switzerland, Holland, Italy, Denmark, Norway and Belgium arrived in Raleigh to be welcomed officially by Governor Terry Sanford and set out on a six-day tour that will take them from the Atlantic Ocean to the Great Smoky Mountains.
A combination of air and bus transportation were used to whisk the Europeans from Raleigh to Morehead City on Monday morning for a day's fishing and to historic New Bern for a brief visit to North Carolina's colonial capital, Tryon Palace, and overnight.
Golf came on Wednesday, October 10, on Pinehurst's world famous courses, and the following day the group will fly to Asheville for a tour of Cherokee Indianland and other mountain attractions.
In between, they will visit North Carolina industries and Old Salem at Winston-Salem, and will end their tour at Charlotte's jet airport after visiting the Coliseum and Merchandise Mart, scene of North Carolina's International Trade Fair.
Designated the "Governor's Tour of North Carolina", the expedition is sponsored by the Travel Council of North Carolina with the cooperation of the North Carolina Industrial Council and the Department of Conservation and Development.

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Veterans News

J. D. DeRamus, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office, said today the office had received a number of inquiries from private investors concerning \$220 million in mortgage loans VA has offered for sale during the month of July.

DeRamus said the Regional Office is participating in the sale and has offered \$1,602,000 in mortgages, as part of the nation-wide offering.

All mortgages will be sold under a special VA Guaranty agreement which will obligate the VA to re-purchase the mortgage, if a serious default develops after the sale to an investor.

The loans being sold are purchased money mortgages which were taken by the VA to secure the payment of the balance of houses sold by VA. These properties were acquired by VA when private lenders terminated GI loans which they held and which the VA had guaranteed under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act.

Interest rates on the loans to be sold vary, ranging from 5 to 5 3/4 per cent. The loans are in blocks grouped to geographic location and interest rate in amounts from about \$100,000 to \$1,000,000.

DeRamus said any investor may obtain a list of the loans, forms for submitting bids and other information

from the Winston-Salem VA Regional Office, 310 West Fourth Street.
