Unless the mailer is absolutely sure of the correct address it is suggested all cards be mailed at the first class rate of postage as they will be transferred or forwarded to the correct address if it is known by the Post Office.

A word of caution to all mailers. Wrap and tie your **Building & Loan** parcels securely. Do not use a thin tissue paper as outside wrapping or use a thin unsupported box in which to mail your gifts.
