



Jackson Is **Graduated At Army School**

Chaplain (Major) Louis Miller Jackson, a Southern Bap-tist chaplain of Ridgecrest was one of 26 officers gradu-ated Dec. 19, in the first (permanent change of station) career class of the Army Chaplain school, Fort Hamilton, Brooklyn, N. Y., after 21 weeks of intensive study. There were 19 Protestant and seven Catholic chaplains graduating.

The United States Continental Army Command provided the speaker for the oc-casion in the person of Col. Roy T. Dodge, USCONARC Director of Army Schools. Colonel Dodge defined competent officers as those made adequate by comprehensive and up-to-date knowledge. He particularly emphasized the dual role of the Army chaplain as he advises his commanding officer in matters of religion, morale, and welfare, and as he serves the religious needs of soldiers and their dependents.

Chaplain Jackson will report for his next assignment to the 2nd Infantry Division at Fort Benning, Ga. The 2nd has a long history of military ex-cellence and achievement in many wars engaged in by the United States. He will be accompanied to Fort Benning by his wife, Mary Nell, and his daughters, Beth and Anne.


