WINSTON-SALEM, N. C.—The Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation has voted support totalling \$1,500,000 to the Medical Center Development Program of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine and North Carolina Baptist Hospital.

The contribution was announced by John F. Watlington Jr., general chairman of the medical center campaign for \$7,000,000 in private capital funds.

Total cost of the proposed medical center expansion project is estimated at \$16,250,000. And approximately half the amount is expected to be obtained from government and other special sources.
