



An Ace in the Hole Helps

In a tug of war, the fellow with an ace in the hole is apt to win Dieters may have another kind of reserve ace in their tug of war against hunger. The ace? Eating foods with a generous starch-carbohydrate content—such as, bread, cereal, and pola-toes—rather than sugar. Research in progress at the State Uni-versity of Iowa has cast starch-carbohydrate foods in the envied role of appetite appeasers.

role of appente appeasers. This role was indicated, Dr. Margaret Ohlson told a recent nutrition conference, in a series of experiments designed to learn the relation of nutrition to heart disease. Bread, cereal, and potatoes, she and her fellow researchers found, satisfied hunger almost too well. Subjects on a test diet—in which the form of carbohydrate was switched from sugar to starch on a calorie for calorie basis—complained bitterly of feeling "stuffed," even after four weeks. All subjects would have lost weight, Dr. Ohlson said, if they were allowed to stop eating when their hunger was appeased. Sugar had no such satisfying effect.
