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Warhorses Edged Out By Eagles In Thriller To Take District A A Title

The undefeated Owen Warhorses were edged by a fraction of time Friday night at the Canton Stadium by the Sylva Webster Eagles. This places the Eagles in position to play Maiden High next week in Asheville for the State AA championship.

The entire first half filled the capacity 4500 crowd with suspense and sharp action, but neither team could score against the other's defense. Quarterback Love showed terrific evasive action in doing 90 percent of ball handling for the Eagles.

Junior fullback Ted Luckadoo led the night with yardage plunges for amazing gain. He scored from the 10 yard line at the beginning of the second half backed by a 61 yard march by Bridges and Coman in the backfield and end Yogi McElrath.

When the Eagles gained the ball they were punched back 29 yards on the first two downs. Then the key play of the game occurred. Wingback Jim Grant managed to evade his opposing defense and Love connected to him for a 76 yard touchdown, tying the score.

The Warhorses' offense went into action again in the fourth quarter on their own 43 yard line and marched to the 20. There they were forced

K. O. McMahan With 1st Fleet "Range Bush"

Aviation Machinist's Mate Airman Kenneth O. McMahan, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene McMahan of Black Mountain, is participating in the U. S. First Fleet's training exercise "Range Bush" Nov. 18-24, while serving with Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron 11.

The week-long exercise off the coast of Southern California involves ships of the First Fleet and several naval air units, comprising "friendly" forces, in aerial reconnaissance, anti-air and anti-submarine warfare operations against the "enemy" air, surface and sub-surface units portrayed by other Navy units. The exercise will increase the combat readiness of the First Fleet.

Exercise "Range Bush" is under the overall command of the First Fleet Commander, Vice Admiral Lawson P. Ramo, USN. His squadron is maintaining a continuous early warning radar surveillance against "enemy" aircraft.

With only 45 seconds left in the ball game, Owen strained with all it had to score and top the Eagle's 12 points. They came within a hair's breadth of doing it.

On the fourth down, Jim Coman passed to his number 1 halfback, Danny Bridges. Bridges dodged tacklers left and right running down near the sideline. Due to the presence of one tackler being in a key position for the Eagles Bridges was downed on the 20 yard line with an open field remaining before him.

This writer, as well as other Owen fans, feels that this year's Warhorses team is the finest we have been privileged to support.

The play is directed by David Hempleman of the English Department, and Mrs. Ohler directs the decor and costumes. Elia Kazan, who directed the New York production says of the play in his Directors notebook this is a story of love—the end of a tragic love between Willy and his son Biff.....This play is about Love and Competition—the two opposing forces, good and bad, creative and malignant, in one society.....

The cast is made up of one foreign student, Anuar Accawi from Lebanon, and eleven others. None are local residents.
