



Recreation Body To Join County

The Black Mountain Recreation Committee and the town authorities have unanimously agreed to give up plans to establish a local recreation commission.

Andy Andrews, chairman of Beacon.

of the Buncombe County Recreation Commission, said a four acre tract of land owned

by the town of Black Mountain will be deeded to the county for development for recreational purposes. He said Andrews told him the decision was reached at a joint meeting of the local recreation

committee and the town aldermen. Several weeks ago the Buncombe County Recreation Commission recommended

such a move to avoid duplication of effort in obtaining funds from various federal sources.

Swannanoa Valley industry is being contacted for financial aid for the program.
