More important, we will have a broader and fairer tax system; thousands of people who do not now pay local taxes (including over three million tourists each year plus thousands of regional shoppers) will pay a fair share. And we will have a source of tax income that will grow with our local population and economy to meet the needs of a growing community.

Think about it. If you do, we think you will vote FOR the local sales tax on November 4th.
