

Upon graduation from high school, he at-tended Maryville College in Tennessee. After his marriage, he continued his education at the University of Pennsylvania.

As a young man during the Depression, he had a variety of types of work in the Carolinas and Georgia.

In World War II he became personnel director for Dravo Shipbuildinging Corporation in Wilmington, Del. After the war, he joined International Telephone & Telegraph in New York City. He became a vicepresident in charge of Labor Relations, and continued in this capacity until his retirement in 1969.

Mrs. McMakin (nee Anna Probst) was born and reared in Walhalla, S. C. She graduated from Winthrop College with a major in Physics.

For four years she taught science and math in Sharon High School in Mecklenburg County. It was here that she met her future husband.


