M-A College Enrollment Up

Unofficial enrollment figures for the spring semester at Montreat - Anderson College show 419 students enrolled, a 5.6 per cent rise over the same time last year, but a 2 per cent drop

over fall semester.

The rise breaks a trend in that M-AC typically as a 10-15 per cent decline between semesters, Registrar Lenore Saunders observes. Last year's spring semester

Mrs. Saunders reports 34 new students enrolling with 385 fall students returning. Of the current enrollment, 38 are day students.
