Report From The Office Of Town Manager

The Chief of Police, Crait Slagle, and the Town Manager, attended a regular meeting of the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee on Friday, March 23rd. The Committee acted on a recommendation from Mayor Slagle and elected Chief Slagle to serve on the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee.

We would like to welcome Mrs. Lina Munday of Black Mountain, to our staff at Town Hall. She has filled a secretarial position in our Police Department, as a result of the Emergency Employment Program.

The Town has requested that additional "speed limit" signs and "children playing" signs be erected on North Fork Road. The Department of Transportation has advised us that these signs will be put on their work list for placement as soon as possible. A large number of speeding cars due to an insufficient number of signs has been the cause for great concern to the residents of this area, especially those families with children. Hopefully these additional signs and a greater awareness of the hazards will reduce the speeding problem on North Fork Road.
