During the next few weeks, he Black Mountain Depot Association will be visiting and studying the restored depots in other communities. We would like to share this information with you.

The old railroad station on the north end of Eighth Street in Shelbyville, Kentucky was o have been destroyed in 1972. Dr. and Mrs. Donald Chatham bought the building at that ime and had it moved intact o its present location.

The station was built by the L&N Railroad in 1895. For 77 years it had served the area Teddy Roosevelt and Harry Truman both campaigned here. Roosevelt in 1912 and Truman in 1948.

The building is a lovely example of Victorian architecture. The moving and restorations project took from August 1972 to June 1974. A visit to Chatham Station is indeed a journey through the past, but it also provides a service for the present and a purpose for the future.


