CP&L to raise rates, notes fuel price hike

Under a formula approved by the North Carolina Utilities Commission, the fuel charge is based on CP&L's average cost of fuel required to generate electricity in the third, fourth and fifth preceding months, which in this case are November. December and January. "The fuel charge provides

no additional earnings for CP&L," Davis said. "It just helps us cover our cost for fuel burned to generate the electricity our customers require.'

Editor's Note: The following article is part of a series on staff members here at the Black Mountain News. We will try to show the different steps to producing a newspaper, as well as give you an idea of how dedicated and energetic a person must be to help turn out a good newspaper.

"I did this two or three times before I got it how I wanted it," Charlie Taylor said, indicating the photo and lettering, or "flag" that appears at the top of this page.

Charlie is a perfectionist. One need only watch him "ink in" scratches and accidental spots in a negative to appreciate an unblemished copy of the News.

A native of Black Mountain, Charlie has had nine years experience working with letterpress and offset newspapers before returning to his hometown paper.

said. "I learned printing here in '68. This paper was done with a letterpress then." He is a 1965 graduate of Owen High

With surgeon's hands, he painted out the old linotype background, making the blacks blacker and the whites whiter. He then superimposed the type over the photo. The job took four hours of his own
