that the employees being exempted are not breadwinners, but supplemental

wage earners. "Since many of these temporary jobs have uncertain hours, and since room and board and recreation are really a large part of the experience, the hours of work restrictions and overtime requirements for such personnel-as cabin counsellors, as well as hourly wages, simply do not fit the camp and con-ference reality,'he noted.

There is good news and bad news .in the most recent tobacco statistics from the U.S. Department of




