A reception was held in Monte Hotel.

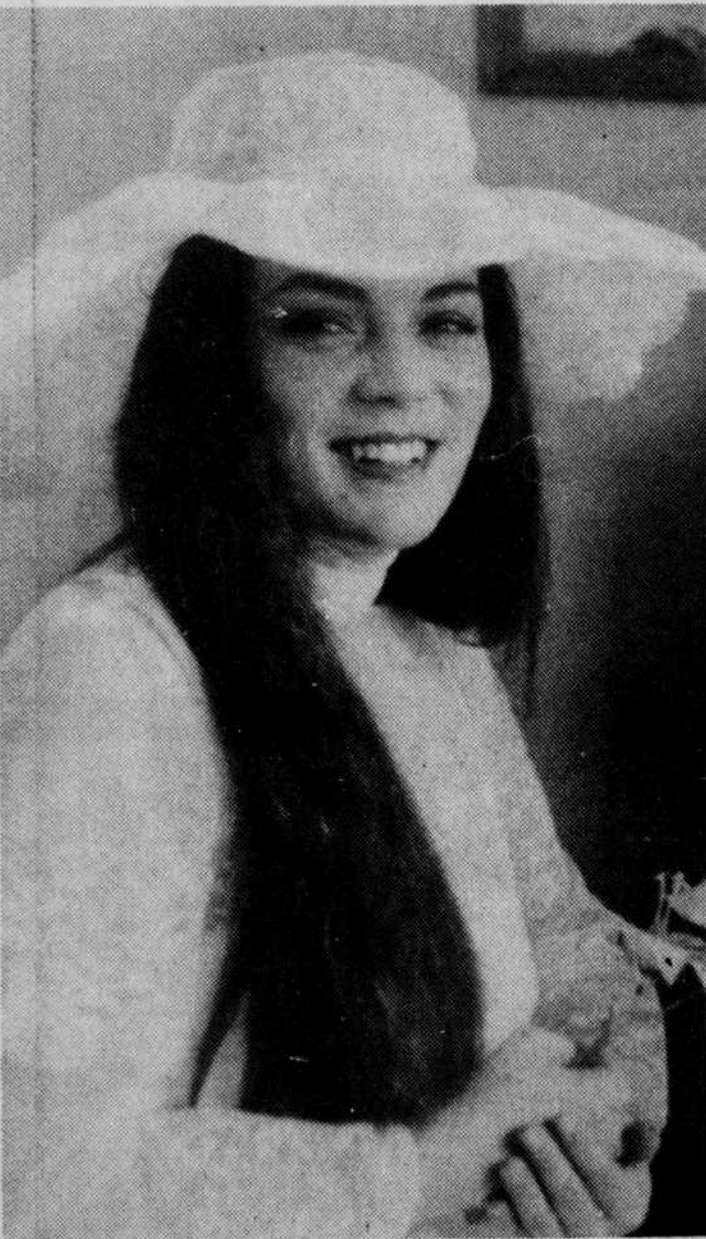
Joy Minnick directed the wedding and Merita Wheeler was in charge of the bride's register.
