JACK VELOCK BECOMES I. N. S. SPORTS EDITOR

The New Bernian to Have Exclusive Rights for His Articles in New Bern.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The International News Service announces Jack Velock, of Indianapolis, will become its sporting editor Monday, November 27, succeeding Frank G. Menke, whose resignation was recently accepted.

Mr. Velock is well known throughout the country for his articles on baseball, boxing and other sports. The Middle West is especially familiar with his comment on football.

He will write the International News Service daily sport feature article, besides sport paragraphs and humorous verses on sport topics. In short, he expects to combine the feature idea with the sport "colyum." He will also cover as many large sporting events in person as possible. In addition to Mr. Velock, the International News Service is making plans to strengthen its sporting service by employing expert sport writers in several sections of the country.

SHERIFF'S AUTO IS HIT BY LOCOMOTIVE

Occupants Escaped Uninjured
But Top of Machine is
Wrecked.

Sheriff R. B. Lane, Deputy Sheriff T. H. Smith and Mr. W. E. Perry had a narrow escape from serious injury late Friday afternoon when one of the Norfolk Southern yard engines crashed into an automobile in which the party was riding. Except badly damaging the top there was little damage to the automobile and all the occupants escaped without injury.

Sheriff Lane had been in the northwestern part of the city to serve a claim and delivery paper and the party were returning when the accident occurred. They were crossing B street. On either side were cars which obstructed the view of the engine which was running light and making little or no noise. The motorist and the engineer were both ignorant of the presence of the other until it was too late to avoid the accident.

The railroad company compromised the matter by having the broken top replaced with a new one.

TWO BOYS SENT IN FALSE FIRE ALARMS

Captain Bryan Nabs Youths in Act of Calling Out The Firemen.

During the past few weeks the firemen have been put to a great deal of trouble on account of false alarms of fire being turned in from boxes situated in the western and northwestern parts of the city. Efforts by both the firemen and policemen have been made to learn the identity of the person or persons thus violating the law, but they were unsuccessful until yesterday when Captain A. L. Bryan hauled in his net and found in it, Eddie Harris and Tim Sikes, two colored boys who appear to be about eight or nine years of age.

It has been the "custom" of some one to call out the fire trucks either Saturday afternoon or night for several weeks. Captain Bryan had his plans made for them yesterday afternoon, and he went to the vicinity of Main and Murray streets with the intention of remaining until he learned who the violators were. He did not wait long before the boys appeared on the scene and sent in an alarm.

It was the officer's intention to place the boys in jail, but as they were so small they were released and their parents recognized to have them at the city hall Monday morning at eleven o'clock.

FRENCH DRESSING FOR SALAD

JOHN KILONIS WON FROM RESS

Greek Wrestler, Well Known Here Defeated Big New Yorker.

The following from the Wilmington Star of the 25th will be of interest here as Ressa is to be seen in action here during the next few weeks:

John Kilonis, of Norfolk, and Ludwig Ressa, of New York, met at Woolwin hall last night in one of the fastest, hardest fought and most exciting wrestling matches seen here in several seasons, Kilonis winning in two straight falls, the first in 27½ minutes and the second in 42½. The Greek used the flying mare to secure both of his falls, this apparently being the only hold from which the blond Belgian could not escape.

Both men are in the light heavyweight class, and for this class their work was easily as fast as ever seen on a local mat. Not only fast, but spectacular practically throughout the duration of the match. They were almost evenly matched in weight, strength and skill, so far as the eye could tell, but when it came to speed Kilonis, perhaps had a shade the better of it over his blond opponent.

In the mild mannered Belgian boy, however, he caught a tartar when he started his usual rough tactics, and literally drove his swart adversary out of the ring. Kilonis, after the first ten minutes of the first fall, and after some samples of his kind of "turn the other cheek" tactics dispensed by the Belgian, fought a wary fight, saving himself all that he could and never taking a chance. On the other hand Ressa frequently took chances that perhaps it might have been wiser to avoid, and it may have been due to this fact that he fell into the deadly trap of the flying mare each time.

The match was refereed by Jimmy Wade, and was witnessed by quite a large gathering of enthusiastic mat fans.

ORDINANCE

Be it Ordained By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern: That chapter 21 of the ordinance of the City is amended by adding to the end thereof the following section, to-wit:—

"Sec. 42. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep within the city any cross-hill or hide or other salt, cure or dry salt, unless such hide or hides be kept, salted, cured or dried within a room having a floor and walls made of concrete or cement, and washable, with ample sewer and drain connections between such room and the sanitary sewerage system of the city. Whoever violates this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined the sum of ten dollars; and each day such hide or hides shall be kept within the city contrary to the provisions hereof shall constitute a separate offense."

ORDINANCE

Be it Ordained By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern: That section 19 of chapter 5 of the ordinance of the city be amended so as to read as follows:—

"Sec. 19. The charge for carrying passengers in public hacks, taxicabs, carriages, omnibuses or automobiles from any place within the city to the Eastern Carolina Fair grounds, or from said Fair Association grounds to any place within the city, during any of the annual fairs, or from one place in the city to another, shall not exceed the rate of fifteen cents for each person carried. A printed copy of this ordinance shall be posted in the tax collector to every person licensed to use any vehicle on the streets of New Bern for carrying passengers for hire and the said copy shall be posted in a conspicuous place in every such vehicle in the streets unless said copy is posted as aforesaid. Whoever violates this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined five dollars for each offense, and each day such violation shall be continued shall constitute a separate offense, and upon conviction of the violation of this ordinance the license to use such vehicle upon the streets for carrying passengers for hire shall be revoked."

ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern: That chapter 6 of the ordinance of the city be amended by adding to the end thereof the following:—

"Sec. 12.—It shall be unlawful for any person to hold in or around the public schools in the city, or to interfere with the conduct of said schools by whistling, shouting, signaling or otherwise attracting the attention of pupils or disturbing the teachers in said schools, or for any person, to enter upon, ride or walk through or on said school grounds unless such entry be made to attend to business at such school or with the permission of the superintendent of schools. Whoever violates this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, he shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars."
