# LOCAL POLITICAL GOSSIP.

Col. Johnston Declines To Ron Against MeDowell.

The President yesterday appointed Archibald Brady postmaster of Charlotta.

This appointment suds a long local struggle between Charlotte Republicans. Mr. Brady was opposed by nearly all the party workers here. His backing consisted of a few prominent gentlemen who are Republicans from principle, but who eschew local politics.

The appointment is in keeping with the President's policy to build up a white man's Republican Party in the South. It was made clear to Mr. Har-rison that Mr. Brady had declined to run on the Republican ticket for the State Senate, and that he had even scratched the local ticket. These are strong points in the North and West against an applicant for office, but here in the South, they seem to have weight in favor of an applicant. In other words, Mr. Harrison rather seeks to encourage the idea of an indepen-dent genteel white Republican who is willing to fly in the face of the negro vote. As the negro vote has rather tend-ed to defeat the Republican party in the South, than otherwise, the President's policy is eminently practical politics.

#### LOCAL POLITICS.

Beating About for's Candidate for Mayor Against MeDowell.

The negroes are growing restive un-der the idea that there is likely to be no contest for the mayoralty this year. The darky is a "floater" who believes in Dudley's principle of "blocks of five," and it breaks his heart to think of an election where there is only one ction where there is only one candidate.

At first it was thought that Col. Wm. Johnston could be persuaded to be an Independent candidate; but that hope has to be abandoned: Col. Johnston or Monday. in reply to a direct question from a Democratic worker who is in sympathy with the Colonel in his protective tariff views, said he had de-clined overtures to become a candidate for the mayoralty; and further, that on no condition would he allow his name to be used.

Now, in the face of this manly and altogether honorable and direct state ment from Col. Johnston, there are persons who for their own ends, would seek to discredit the Colonel's veracity, or sincerity, by saying that he will be run anyhow. Of course, every one who knows Col. Johnston feels that such rumors are as unjust as unkind; and that any attempt to drag the Colonel into a contest, must meet with a sound rebuff and rebuke.

Another rumor that was passed around among the 'faithfull' disgrant-led and "blocks of five" crowd, is that Jim Sims is to be nominated by the negroes; and that under the guise of his candidacy the forces will be organ-ized and ,marshalled for the election: and that on the day before election, the name of Col. Johnston will be on the tickets instead of that of Sims. However true this may be as to the inten-tion of the "floaters" in blocks of five, no one, for a moment, would believe that Col. Johnston would tolerate such

a trifling with him. Whether or not Sims will be a can-didate is another matter; but that is hardly probable, as the object of the negroes is to have a contest, in order that their "influence" may be appreci-

### COTTON MOVEMENT LAST WEEK.

Statistics Compiled From the New York Financial Chronicle's Reports.

For the week ending Friday evening the total receipts reached 38,922 bales, against 45,500 bales the previous week making the total receipts since the 1st of Sept., 1888, 5,352,723 bales, against 5,190,084 bales for the same period of

1887--8 showing an increase since Sept. 1, 1888, of 162,639 bales. The exports for the week ending Fri-day evening reached a total of 57,744 bales, of which 36,755 were to Great Britain, 2.074 to France and 18.915 to

the rest of the Continent. The figures indicate a decrease in the cotton in sight Friday night of 237,740 bales as compared with the same date of 1888, a decrease of 295,641 bales as

compared with the corresponding date of 1887 and a decrease of 238,509 bales as compared with 1886.

The totals show that the old interior stocks have decreased during the week 24,785 bales, and were Friday night 114,-901 bales less than at the same period last year. The receipts at the same towns have been 1,033 bales less than the same week last year, and since Sept. 1, the receipts at all the towns are 105,279 bales more than for the same time in 1887-88. The Financial Chronicle's statement

It is not generally known that a son of Stephen A. Douglas, of Illinois, was born in North Carolina, but such was the case. When the keen Vermonter had won over the Illinois Democracy For Cash thisWeek had won over the links Democracy to send him to Congress in 1843, he was but thirty years of age. There the "Little Giant" met Representative Da-vid S. Reid, of North Carolina. Reid thisWeek was born April 19, 1813, and Douglas April 23, 1818. They were the infants of the twenty-eighth Congress, and a warm friendship sprung up between For Cash thisWeek

them. As a result of their acquaintance Douglas married akinswoman of Reid's, Miss Martha Martin, the daughter of a wealthy North Carolina planter. The son referred to-Robert M. Douglaswas born within thirty miles of where he now lives, at Greensboro. He is now at the Ebbitt. In physical appearance he bears considerable resemblance to his noted father, though rather slighter. He has also inherited his share of brains. At the age of nineteen he was Private Secretary to the Governor of North Carolina and during the first four years of President Grant's administration was his civilian Secretary. In 1872 he was appointed marshal of North Carolina, which position he held for several years. He is now practicing

"The western end of North Carolina," said he, "is strongly Republican. We have our votes counted there, too, as our majority is a white majority. Down in the black counties the Republicans fail to get their rights. If the offices are judiciously distributed I think the party will be aided, but at present there is a strong sectional feeling. Before this the offices have proved an injury, and not a benefit.
