regular summer school. Those from Inson county being Misses Phoebe Watkins, Julia Cameron, Lucile and Williams, Jean Lea Clarke, Louise Emma Little, Ann Little Massemore, Mrs. Thompson, Miss Nelle Ethridge, the Wadesboro Domestic Science teacher and her mother formed such an interesting picture of mother and daughter going to school to-It was pleasant too to see Mrs. Mendenhall who was a former teacher at Polkton.

They have a way at the collewe of teaching promptness at meal time. A bell is rung for ten minutes just before each meal and if you are not in the dining room within the time it is ringing or two minutes after it stops the doors are closed and you must do without. It was funny to see how everybody learned how to run, both maids and matrons.

Our class work consisted in lessons in Dress Designs, drafting of patterns, Landscape Gardening, House Furnishings, Dyeing, Millinery, Health, Pickling and Jelly Making. A class of 23 agents was taught by the agents from Anson and Lincoln counties, in canning. We gave a two hour lesson for five mornings in canning in tin, in glass, in preparing exhibits for State and County Fairs, commercial canning, in using steam pressure for canning and for cooking. At night lectures on literary subjects were given and recitals on the pipe organ and other instruments, The dress design lectures were given by Mirs Brown from Pratts College, were practical in every way. and

What to do With Tomatoes.

Soup Mixture-Five quarts toma toes, two quarts, corn, 2 quarts okra, tablespoonfuls sugar, (level) 2 tablespoons salt (level). Scald and peel tomatoes, cutting out green or hard spots. Chop and measure. Cut young and tender field or sugar corn from cob. Slice okra in rings, 1-4 inch thick. Peel and quarter toma-Place all in open agate kettle toes and boil until thick. Pour in No. 2 can while hot, seal and process one hour. Process a No. 3 can 11/2 hours. Process qt. jars 112 hours.

Tomato Ketchup-Select red-ripe tomatoes. The extra juice, small and broken fruit, which will not do for canning, may be used, if they are sound red. Use whole spices tied loosely in a bag while cooking, and remove before bottling to prevent darkening the product caused by the ground spices. Cook the tomatoes thoroughly, put through a colander or sieve, saving all pulp, and meas ure. For every gallon of pulp, use the following:

2 tablespoonfuls of salt, 4 table spoonfuls of sugar, 1 tablespoonful of mustard (powdered), 1 pint of good cider vinegar, 1 level tablespoonful each of allspice, cloves, cinnamon, and pepper. 2 small red pep-pers, sliced and seed removed.

After putting tomatoes through colander, add the ground spices tied in bags, and cook for one and onehalf hours, or until nearly thick enough, then add vinegar and cook un-

while hot. This is good served with FORTY-THREE GALLONS OF cold meats.

It is very necessary in making pickle, to use plenty of spiced vine-When filling jars, don't. pack gar vegetables in tight, leaving but little room for the vinegar, as you will loose the fine pungent flavor. If the amount called for in the recipe should fail to cover all the ingredients, add enough to cover. Usually 10 min-utes is long enough to cook the vege-Ranes proceeded to grub up 43 gal tables, as we wish to keep them crisp and brittle. Always seal while hot, using new rubbers, because when left in loosely sealed jars, the flavor dies out.

large onions, sliced, 1 teaspoonful ground black pepper, small red pepper, tablesnoons white mustard seed,

%cup celery seed, 2 pounds brown sugar,

tablespoon allspice,

tablespoon cloves, pounded, and

tied loosely in muslin bag.

Sprinkle sliced tomatoes and sliced onions with salt. Let stand 4 hours in separate bowls, then soak in cold water 4 hours. Drain well, pressing out the water.

Put in porcelain kettle, mixing the mustard and celery seed, sugar and pepper, thoroughly with chopped ingredients. Cover with good vinegar to which the spices have been added.

Boil slowly until quite soft and tender. This pickle is not good if removed from the fire before the tomatoes are tender. After cooking place in the jars with plenty of the prepared vinegar and seal while hot.

Mixed Pickles or Chow Chow.

3 large heads of cabbage, 1 quart of vinegar, 2 pounds of sugar, ounce each of cloves, cinnomon, allspice and mace, 1 peck of green tomatoes, 1 dozen medium sized onions, 2 dozen cucumbers, 1 dozen green peppers

Chop them separately and very fine. Mix all together and put in alternate layers of mixture and salt, using a cup full of salt. Let stand over night. Then squeeze dry and cover with cold vinegar. Let it stand fore. Mix vinegar with spices, add urer. sugar, boil for five minutes, then add vegetables and boil for five minthe boiling spiced vinegar. Seal immediately.
