The church was simply, yet beautifully decorated. White drapings covered the pulpit and every appointment was perfect. The ring ceremony was used during the ceremony the candles burned around the altar. The ushers were Messrs. Bate, Blanton, Jap Suttle, John L. Sear and Tom Eskridge, and these were followed by the twenty flower girl, Miss Marie Heberger, and cunning ring bearer, William Andrews. Next came Miss Eva Stacy, of Gaffney, S. The Rutherford Tribune says: "The west bound freight train on the S. A. L., in charge of Capt. W. D. Broadway, was partially wrecked one mile east of Lattimore Wednesday at 12:30 p. m. Two or three coal cars left the track and were completely broken up and the coal scattered in every direction. Capt. Broadway was cut about the head and face, but not so injured as to prevent his usual duties. No one else was hurt. When the west bound passenger train, due here at 2 o'clock, arrived at the scene of the wreck, the passengers, mail and baggage were transferred to a box car and pulled into Rutherfordton at 3:30, an hour and a half late."
