WORLD WAR ECHOES Short Paragraphs of More or Less Interest. Germany had a number of vegetarian regiments in active service during the world war. It is reported that Fort Riley, in Kansas, is to be made the largest avary station in the United States. State and national dues to new members of the American Legion in Pennsylvania amount to \$1.75 a year. It has been announced that the sum of \$400,000 monthly will be required to run the League of Nations next year. Private C. T. Warr, has been declared to be the youngest soldier at the marine training camp, Quantico, Va. Only 173,911 alleged draft evaders of the United States army remain unaccounted for in the records of the war department files. More than 50,000 women throughout the United States are enrolled under the banner of the Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion. Armies of France, England and the United States are engaged in important experiments toward developing and improving war tanks. After July 1, 1921, the minimum strength at which National Guard infantry companies may be maintained is 65 active enlisted men. Four Italian admirals and ten other naval officers of that country United States naval cross in Rome. The allied reparations commission has presented to the German government a demand for the immediate of 10,000 bulls and 500,000 cows in France; 11,500 head of cattle to Italy; 210,000 cows to Belgium and 157,000 head of cattle to Serbia. Because a number of soldiers, listed in bronze as dead, have turned up safely at home the war memorial tablet in front of the court house at Reading, Pa., must be revised. Names of more than 20 men now known as dead do not appear on the tablet. During the world war the public sent a total of 110,000 inventions or ideas for inventions to the United States navy. Of that number which had to be examined and passed upon, only about one suggestion in a thousand was found to possess any practical value. General Pershing has been appointed a member of the committee arranging for the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the death of Napoleon Bonaparte. Marshal Foch is honorary president, Marshal Haig, of Great Britain and Gen. Diaz of Italy, will also be members of the body. The army transport Pocahontas which recently arrived in New York from Antwerp and St. Nazaire, carried the bodies of 2,185 American soldiers killed in France. Among the passengers were 53 "war brides" from Belgium, Czecho-Slovakia, England, France and Germany, 11 prisoners from the army of occupation in Germany and four stowaways.

THREE STILLS ARE TAKEN ONE A TINY COPPER AFFAIR Three stills were recently captured in upper Cleveland, one of which was a tiny copper affair with a capacity of about three gallons. Deputy E. W. Dixon captured the small still which looks more like a toy, but it was large enough to serve a family and make a bit to spare. It could be operated in the home and was a handsome little miniature of a full grown still that makes for wholesale consumption. Mr. Frank Morrison captured a still near Pete Wright's in No. 11 township and Deputy Dixon got another with a capacity of 45 or 40 gallons in No. 10. This was made of galvanized iron.
