## SOLEMN AND IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES MARK ARMISTICE CELEBRATION HERE

Trees Are Planted In Sunset Cemetery For 31 Men Who Made The Supreme Sacrifice-Citations For Bravery Of Champion, Gold and Turner.

Solemn and impressive ceremonies were held in Shelby Friday in observance of Armistice Day, exercises being carried out in the Court House at a community Prayer meeting and in the Graded School auditorium by the school children. Youngsters of the town had a Fourth of July spirit in their bones and gave vent to their feelings by noisy pistols, automobile horns, etc. but older heads sent up prayers for the Disarmament Conference in the City of Washington which met Saturday with representatives from nine of the leading powers of the earth present to discuss a limitation or reduction of implements of

Trees for Deceased Soldiers

At the cemetery Friday morning 31 pretty sugar maple trees were planted in honor of the 31 young men who paid the supreme sacrifice and at the foot of each -tree will be placed a granite marker with the name of the soldier the tree represents, together with the unit to which he belonged. Each year the relatives and friends will place flowers at the foot of these trees to memoralize the boys who died in the service of their country. The Civic Department of the Woman's Club deserves the thanks of the whole community in thus honoring the dead. They have been at considerable expense in buying trees and markers so contributions to the fund will be cheerfully received by Mrs. L. A. Blanton and Mrs. O. Max Gardner. In the Court House promptly at 11:30 o'clock before an audience that filled the large auditorium, Rev. W. A. Murray acting as master of ceremonies read President Harding's proclamation which reads as follows: "I, Warren G. Harding, President of the United States of America, do hereby call upon all devout and patriotic citizens of the United States to pause from their accustomed occupations and labors on Friday the 11 day of November from 12 o'clock noon to two minutes past that hour for a period of silent prayer and thanks to the Giver of all good."


