Morse, New York ship-builder, whose transactions with the shipping board are under federal investigations was assigned Tuesday before United States Commissioner Isaac R. Hitt, on a warrant charging conspiracy to defraud the United States. The warrant was served upon Mr. Morse in Commissioner Hitt's office by United States Deputy Marshal Fields. Mr. Morse pleaded not guilty, waived a hearing and furnished \$50,000 bail for his appearance before the grand jury. The warrant upon which Mr. Morse was arraigned was issued upon complaint of Frank Burke, manager of the investigation department of the shipping board. It alleged violation of sections 37 and 35 as amended, of the criminal code, charging that Charles W. Morse and his sons, Erwin A., Harry P. and Benjamin B., and others, conspired to defraud the United States. The warrant sets forth that the Morses conspired to 'cheat, swindle and defraud' a corporation in which the United States is and was at that time, a stockholder—the emergency fleet corporation—by making 'certain false and fraudulent statements' in connection with certain contracts and claims.

BABSON HITS AT PRICE DIFFERENCE

Shows Wide Difference Between Manufactured Cost and Consumers Price of Articles

Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 16.—Robert W. Babson, statistical expert, cut deep into America's system of production and distribution today when he told how, in the course of a six week's trip of the United States ending here, he had bought goods in various places to see just what the people were actually getting for their money.

Taking a cotton waist, he told 800 business men at the Pittsburgh Association of Credit Men's luncheon in the William Penn Hotel, he had bought it in a Cleveland store, paying \$6.95 for it. He took it to a jewelry store and found it weighed four ounces; that the raw cotton was worth 4 cents; that the mill received about 10 cents for the goods and that all the materials cost 15 cents. A merchant explained to him that the cost was in the style. He took a cotton handkerchief, which, he said, had one-half of 1 cent's worth of raw material in it and said it cost him 35 cents, although the mill received but 3 to 3 1-2 cents.

Another point Mr. Babson stressed was that the great loss in seasonal buying, return of good and the expense of deliveries, etc., cannot be eliminated so long as wives and children whine as they do for the things they want.

He contended that the purpose of life is to make men rather than goods and to make men strong rather than comfortable; that what we need today is to raise the standard of citizenship because the world does not owe us a living, since we all own the world alike.

The real difficulty with the credit situation he said, was that we are putting work into things that are gone in a moment, instead of building up on something definite. If the public would only consider the responsibility of spending a dollar, much would be accomplished, Mr. Babson insisted.

He said, in conclusion, that we should think in terms of commodities rather than in terms of dollars, and advocated putting back religion in the schools and teaching boys and girls principles, rather than so many facts.

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS BONDS OF THE TOWN OF SHELBY

It is ordered by the governing body of the town of Shelby that bonds of said town of Shelby, a municipality in the county of Cleveland, state of North Carolina, be authorized and issued:

(a) For the purpose of enlarging and extending the waterworks system of said town;

(b) The maximum aggregate principal amount of the bonds to be issued hereunder is \$25,000.

(c) A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

(d) A statement of the debts of the municipality has been filed with the Clerk pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act of North Carolina, and is open to public inspection.

(e) The average assessed valuation of property subject to taxation by the municipality for the three fiscal years in which taxes were last levied, as shown by said statement, is \$4,424,566.

(f) The amount of the net debt of the municipality outstanding, authorized or to be authorized, as shown said statement, is \$232,000.

(g) The probable period of usefulness of the extensions, additions and improvements to be constructed with the funds derived from the sale of said bonds is found and declared to be forty (40) years.

This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed in the manner prescribed by law; and in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the municipality at an election as provided by law.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 6th day of December, 1921, and was first published on the 9th day of December, 1921. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication. MRS. OSCAR M.
