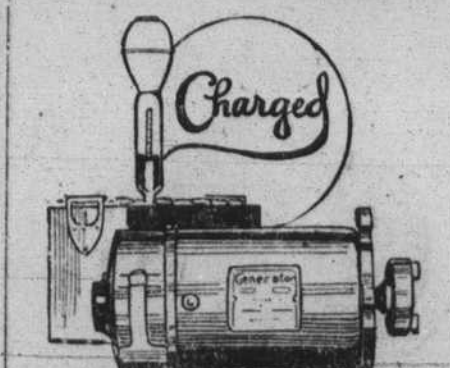

WILL HAVE NO TROUBLE IN FINDING MAN FOR THIS JOB

The official ale taster to duke of Northumberland, England, Frederick Stunckley, of Sion Manor, Iseworth, is dead.

In the good old days when English ale was real ale, pungent, rich in color and possessing a kick unobtainable from any of the lighter, frothy brews at one time familiar in America, many Englishmen considered the dual ale taster the most fortunate man in the king's realm.

He had the authority to enter a public house, call for beer, taste it,

and condemn it if not of good quality. In recent years, however, he had not taken advantage of his official position. The office of ale taster extends back to the time when the Saxons ruled in England. The injunction to the official on assuming his duties was as follows:

"You shall swear that you shall well and truly serve the king's majesty and the Lord of this land, in the office of ale taster.

"You shall have diligent care during the time of your being in office to all the brewers and tipplers within your office, that they and every

one of them do make good and whole some ale and beer for man's body, and that the same be sold according to the prices limited and appointed by the king's justices of the peace."

NORTH CAROLINA HIGH COURT LEADS OTHERS

The North Carolina supreme court led all others in the 48 states of the union in the handling of its 1922 docket, according to a report compiled by John H. Denison, associate justice of the Colorado supreme court, and made public in Nashville Monday by Tennessee court officials.

North Carolina had 800 cases which were disposed of with five at issue, making an average of 160 average cases per judge. Tennessee ranked second with 650 cases disposed of, 50 at issue—an average of 130 cases per judge.

The total number of cases disposed of during the period by all the state supreme courts was 17,709 or about 58 cases per judge per annum, considerably below the average number of cases handled by the judges of the North Carolina and Tennessee judges.

NEGROES FIGHT A DUEL; ONE OF THEM IS DEAD

Because his pistol misfired, and the first shot from his adversary tore away his trigger finger and jammed the magazine of his automatic, Hule Chatman, negro, is dead, and Will Robinson, another negro, is in the Asheville jail held without bond on a charge of murder.

In a pistol-duel which the negroes fought on South Beaumont street in Asheville Sunday night, Chatman beat Robinson to the draw. The superiority of a revolver over an automatic was proved in the outcome of the affray. Chatman, with his pistol leveled at Robinson's head, heard his automatic snap, but there was no resultant explosion. A fraction of a second later Robinson's revolver was in

action. The first bullet put Chatman's finger and automatic out of business and the second found a bullet in his chest. Five shots in all perforated Chatman's body above the heart, in the abdomen, and in the right arm.

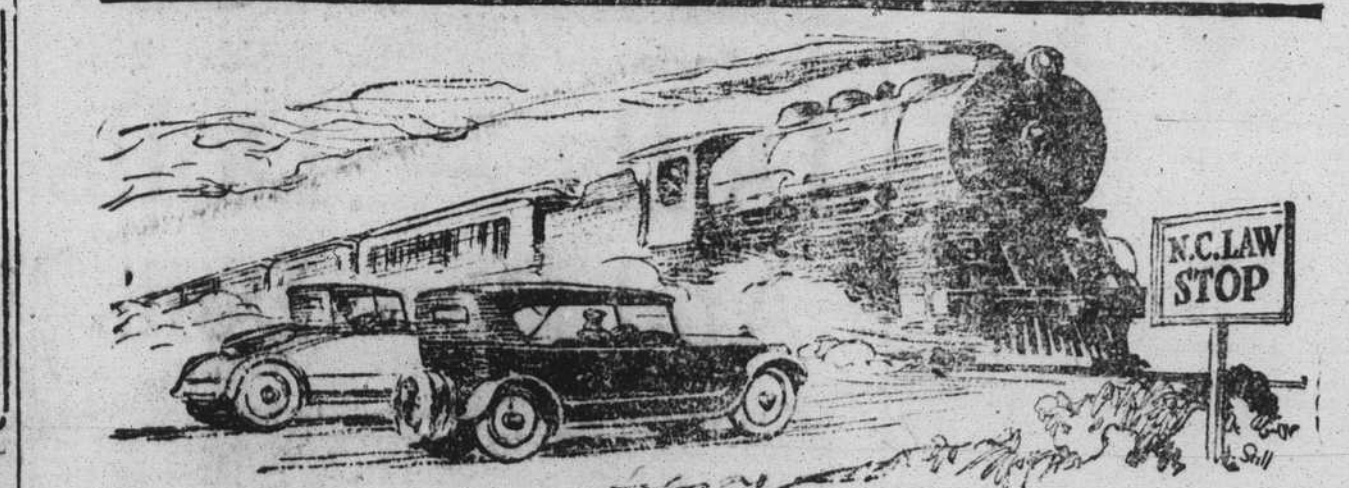

SOUTHERN RAILWAY SYSTEM



For your own protection—

The peril of the road crossing has become a national problem with the multiplication of automobiles. The Southern Railway System has eliminated 584 grade crossings, and is eliminating more every year, but 7,000 remain to be separated on this system alone. The total cost to complete the work is a stupendous sum—probably half as much as the cost to build the railroads.

Even if the money were available, and the public willing to pay the increased freight and passenger rates necessary to provide a fair return on it, many years would be required to do the work. Protection from the peril for the present generation at least must be found in some other way. Trains cannot stop at every crossing if they are to be run at the sustained speed expected by the public and required to carry the commerce of the country. The train crosses a highway about every mile. The motorist encounters a railroad only occasionally.

It is necessary, therefore, for the automobile driver to stop in order to avoid risk. No one who did this was ever killed. In North Carolina, where the law now requires such a stop, the number of road crossing accidents on our lines has been reduced one-half.

Grade crossing accidents can be prevented if you will approach the zone of danger determined to exercise caution For Your Own Protection.

Personal Responsibility Reprinted from the Saturday Evening Post Final dependence for a reduction in the number of railroad grade-crossing disasters must be placed upon the individual's sense of responsibility. If when approaching and crossing a railroad at grade the traveler will think of that crossing as a zone of danger to him, and regard himself and those with him as in imminent danger until the crossing is completed, the chances of accidents will be automatically reduced to the minimum. This grade crossing separation cost \$145,000.
