Cotton's New Record—Cotton production has already passed the record set last year. According to Miles H. Wake, special agent, there were 37,223 bales of cotton ginned in Cleveland county from the crop of 1923 prior to December 1st as compared with 35,019 bales ginned to the same date last year. With over 2,000 bales ahead of last year, this is a new record of cotton production in Cleveland.

Four Stores Robbed—Griffin drug store, Finger drug store, Southern Hardware store and Roy Brown's pressing club of Kings Mountain were all entered and robbed early Monday morning. It is practically certain that the robberies were committed after midnight. It cannot be ascertained just how much loot was secured but it was a plenty.
