"Not What it Useter Be."

Times certainly are not like "they useter be"; a copy of The Cleveland Star of 1905 is proof enough. Some snow fell here this year but if it has leaked through and caused much damage nothing has been said of it. The Star of February 22, 1905 carries the following article:

"Much damage has been sustained by a few of the business men in Shelby during the last two weeks in the leaking of stores and offices. The snow closs upon the roof, melts and runs through—."

Another article by J. A. Anchony, then superintendent of schools offers another contrast. In 1904 total funds derixed for the county schools from all sources was \$20,008.82; \$1,500 went to the building of new school beuses. In 1923 school tax levy in Cleveland county brought in \$160,189 and \$65,000 was placed in new brick school buildings. Seven thousand dollars more was spent for operating expenses in the schools in the county list year than was derived from every source in 1904.

The advertisements in the old paper tell a story all their own. It's almost as easy to find an airplane on Shelby streets today as a buggy, yet in the 1905 paper the late J. D. Lineburger carried a large advertisement telling of the qualities of the Babcock buggy. Nearby was an "ad" of the Farmers Hardware, operated then by A. P. Weathers and the late O. T. Hord, that told how the Oliver Middle huster "busted" em." D. C. Webb's Sons were advertising shirts at 38 cents each; ham was selling at 12 cents per pound and J. Frank Jenkins at the Southern Cotton Oil company, was offering 24 cents—per bushel for "good, sound, dry cotton seed, delivered."

Politics seemed to be the same then as nowadays, however. Clyde R. Hoey democratic county chairman, was calling a democratic primary at the request of Representative R. L. Ryburn, "to ascertain the will of the people." That politics then and now are related we judge from the following edi-
