

LIBERTY BELL NOW ON WHEELS TO LESSEN THE RISK BY FIRE

Philadelphia, May 22.—The Liberty Bell, emblem of American independence, has been effectually safeguarded by being mounted on wheels for quick removal from Independence hall in case of fire.

The bell, according to the regulations worked out, is the first article in the building to be removed if fire breaks out. The guards have been

trailed by repeated drills in the rapid moving of the chime.

In order to make doubly certain that no fire can break out in the building, a fixed rule prohibits placing of any rubbish in the basement. The heating plant has been removed to a specially built cellar apart from the hall. Installation of an automatic sprinkling system is under way.

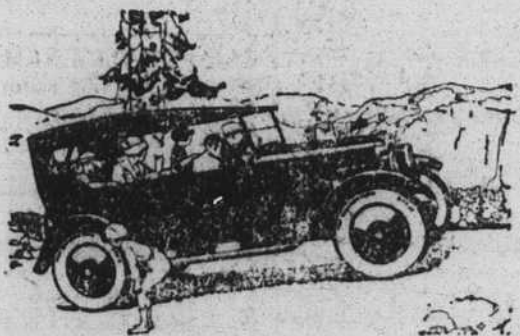

SHELBY HAS FIVE ALL STATE PLAYERS

Cline Lee, Wilson, Wall, Beam and Hoyle Lee Given Berths on Mythical Club.

Five members of the Shelby club North Carolina champions, were named on the mythical all state team of the Greensboro News. The Greensboro News pick made by J. H. Monte, sports editor and Ponzi Dorsett, Greensboro coach follows:

Catcher—Barker (Spencer); Soshier (Pomona) second string and Beam (Shelby) third.

First base—McDowell (Rockingham).

Second base—Griffin (Woodland).

Shortstop—Cline Lee (Shelby).

Third base—White (High Point).

Leftfield—Wilson (Shelby).

Centerfield—Long (Thomasville).

Rightfield—K. Roberson (Leaksville).

Pitchers—Dewar (Woodland); Wall (Shelby); Fife (Greensboro); Hoyle Lee (Shelby).

Utility—Ballard (Rockingham).

This column has seen most of the men in action although none of the eastern nines have been seen. However, the consensus of opinion seems to be, and certainly the championship results bear out the statement, that teams in the east are not on a par with those in the west.

Barker is a heady catcher and a heavy hitter, battling in cleanup position for Spencer, Soshier is a clever receiver and no is Beam.

McDowell is an elongated first sacker whose presence seems to have a steadying effect on the remainder of the team. He is one of the few ball players who wear spectacles while playing. He is fast as a streak and a daring base runner.

Griffin is a heavy hitting keystone and appear to be a better selection than Ballard, who is very good.

Cline Lee is without a doubt the best high school shortstop in the state. He is tall—all arms and legs—and is a sensational fielder.

White, of High Point, is about the most peppery hot corner guard in the commonwealth.

The outfield is remarkably strong. Dick Gurley, the Shelby coach, who departs soon for Lenoir to become athletic director, says he believes Wilson is the fastest high school ball player he has ever seen. Long, of Thomasville is a southpaw fielder and a good hitter. K. Roberson is the slugger of the outfit. When Leaksville played Spencer here Roberson was the only Leaksville player who fielded immaculate, the other eight making at least two boots apiece.

Dewar, Woodland southpaw, gets the call as outstanding pitcher. In three championship games he fanned 20, 18 and 17 batsmen, respectively. Many coaches believe Woodland has the strongest team in the east. Wall's work in holding Rockingham to three hits and no runs in the championship game coupled with his previous work entitles him to second place. Weary Willie Fife, of Greensboro, can make the grade at third and the corps would not be complete without Hoyle Lee.

Wall, native of Rutherford County and graduate of Bowling Springs High school, who later attended Wake Forest college and the Baptist Theological seminary at Louisville, Ky., will move to Shelby next week with his family from Great Falls, S. He will do evangelistic and supply work among Baptist churches and perhaps be open for regular pastoral work in a short time. Mr. Wall has just completed a \$125,000 Baptist church at Great Falls, S. C., where he has been doing a wonderful work among the churches he served. He was here this week looking for a suitable house to secure for his family.

NEGRO SHOT FOUR TIMES IN SUNDAY CHURCH FUSS

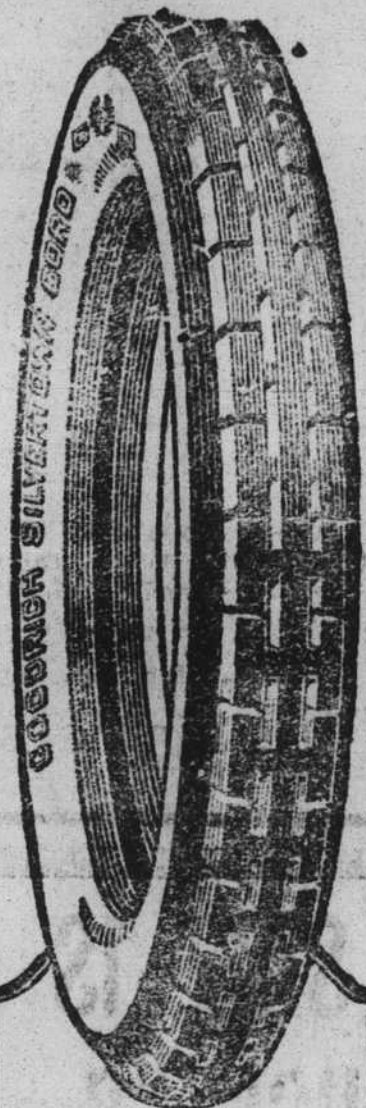
Gaffney Ledger.

Frank Fernandes, negro, shot four times by his son-in-law, Sherman Gaffney, slashes a deep cut across the latter's face before he could make his escape in an altercation at Shady Grove church, in the Macedonia section of the county Sunday afternoon. Fernandes told county officers that he shot several times at Gaffney but failed to hit him. Gaffney was being held in the county jail yesterday while Fernandes was at his home out in the country in a precarious condition.

Gaffney went to Cowpens where his face was sewed together by Dr. Scott. The operation required twelve stitches. Sheriff Jesse G. Wright and county officers who conducted a search for him found Gaffney after his return from Cowpens sitting on the porch at his home.

Fernandas was shot once through the body just above the hip, through the right leg and through both arms. Gaffney used a .32 calibre Smith and Wesson revolver, which was turned over to the sheriff with four empty chambers and a done loaded cartridge in the weapon.

Barrett Says Bailey's Friend Asked Support

Says One Of Mr. Bailey's Friends Asked Herald's Support And Would Give Financial Aid.

Answering the statement made by Hon. J. W. Bailey in Shelby last Saturday in which he said the Charlotte Herald business manager asked him (Bailey) to endorse a \$3,000 note with the promised support for governor, James Barrett, editor of the Charlotte Herald says:

"Speaking of The Charlotte Herald, it is true that the paper was in financial difficulties, and if it's any satisfaction to Mr. Bailey, I will state that the paper is still having a devil of a time getting along. If the business manager of The Herald ever promised Mr. Bailey or any other man that The Herald would support him for governor if he would endorse a note, that business manager was speaking without my knowledge or consent or authority, and this is the first intimation that I've ever had of any such promise.

"No such arrangement could be made, because I have borrowed money from Jews, Catholics, Protestants, republicans and democrats, both factions and worked like the very mischief to pay it all off in cash, just as tens of thousands of other poor devils in business are doing.

Judge Webb Gives Coffey Jail Term

Asheville, May 21.—Severely lecturing all four defendants for their alleged misconduct with Mrs. Gertrude Jenkins, 19, of Spartanburg, Judge E. Yates Webb in federal court Monday morning sentenced Sid Coffey to four months in jail on a charge of violating the Mann white slave act, and suspended judgment against Pink Bright, Lewis Webb and Ed Ingie were found not guilty.

The court found that all four had misadvised themselves with the woman but acquitted Webb and Ingie of the white slave charge on the ground that there was no evidence that they had crossed the state line with the other parties for alleged immoral purposes. He told all of the defendants that the case should be a lesson to them and should cause them to men their ways in the future.

The four defendants were charged with having transported Mrs. Jenkins from Spartanburg, S. C., to Forest City, for alleged immoral purposes, it being alleged that they kept her in an automobile for several days and nights.
