



## Payroll Card System Helps in Avoiding Mistakes

Time, expense and mistakes in computing pay of employes of a large castern company who work on an hourly basis are saved with the use of a system of cards that indicate the length of time a man has worked and the exact amount due. When a task is started, a card, marked in fifteen-minute intervals from 7 o'clock in the morning until 6 o'clock in the evening, is punched to show the



This, added to the mileage completed previously, brought the total for finished projects up to 26,536 miles, or more than enough to circle the earth.
