WILL ASK FOR MORE MONEY FOR SCHOOLS

When the extra session of the general assembly convenes here in August it will be asked by Superintendent of Public Instruction A. T. Allen for authority to make a third loan of \$5,000,000 to the various counties of the state for erection of new schools, according to an announcement made from the office of the superintendent. Under the plan as now carried on the state borrows the money in a large sum at a low rate of interest and lends it to the counties at the same rate of interest thereby allowing them a much lower rate than they could get on small loans. The counties repay the state on 20 annual payments at an average interest rate of 4.5 per cent. The loan is usually for 50 per cent of the cost of the proposed building. Preference is given the smaller counties and em-
