**FOX HUNTERS TO HAVE STATE CHASE**

State Meet to be Held at Seven Springs—Billy DePriest and Walker Are There.

The State Fox Hunters association will have their annual hunt this year at Seven Springs, 12 miles from Goldsboro and 13 miles from Kinston, according to an announcement by W. A. Bristol, of Statesville, an officer of the association.

Writing of Cleveland county hunters and the Walker strain of fox hounds which are owned by many lovers of the chase in Cleveland, Mr. Bristol says in part:

I have known Billy DePriest and Delpha Walker, of Lattimore, and Lester Alexander and T. Ross Alexander of Statesville, to hit the woods, say at 9 o'clock with a pack of 30 hounds to jump and run one or more foxes, and not satisfied with so insignificant a thing as one or two good races lasting a couple of hours each, to grab about two hours sleep just before dawn and then hunt the next day and the next night. There are hundreds of men not only in North Carolina but all over the fox hunting country in the United States with such an insatiable desire to hear fox hounds run.

There must be something more in a sport than a casual observer will see that will draw and thrill men as fox hunting does.

Dr. Sevier's pack of hounds are of the strain known as the Walker fox hound. The Walker fox hound is a strain of hounds which originated in the state of Kentucky and were originally bred by the Walkers of Paint Lick, Ky., and the Maupins of Richmond, Ky. It is said that these dogs are the descendants of one great hound which some Kentuckian found in Tennessee lead crossed on native Kentucky or old Virginia stock with an out cross perhaps to English hounds.

The Walkers have been breeding this strain of hounds for more than 60 years and today their breed of hounds is perhaps better known than any other strain of hounds in America and Dr. Sevier's pack is of the highest type of these Walker hounds.

At Waynesville in Haywood county will be found the wonderful pack of Walker hounds owned by the Illians and John Posey at Murphy. . . owns a pack of Walker hounds second to none. In addition to this I might mention my friends Hal E. Zachary at Franklin and dozens of other prominent fox hunters in that section of the state who own well trained packs of hounds.

Coping east of the Blue Ridge mountains and towards the border of South Carolina, one finds the Walker and the DePriest families, who breed perhaps the most aristocratic hounds in America, known as the July fox hounds.

Billy DePriest and Delpha and Weldon Walker, of Lattimore, own a pack of these wonderful fox hounds and they can trace their pedigrees to two wonderful hounds imported from Ireland and Maryland more than 100 years ago. These dogs are descended from the Maryland hounds crossed on the celebrated pack of hounds owned by a son of Patrick Henry and given by him to a Georgia friend.

**Mr. Hendrick Has Book Printed 111 Years Ago**

Mr. S. E. Hendrick of route 5 has a relic in the nature of a book, Mayo's History and Geography, printed 111 years ago by A. Fagan, Printer, 51 Chestnut street, Philadelphia. The book is bound in sheepskin and is in a fine state of preservation, but the faded pages reveal its age. Mr. Hendrick came into possession of the book at Crowder Hendrick's sale along with a number of other rare volumes. In the front is written "Richard Champion's book, price 43 3/4 cents. Bought at the deceased sale of John Gillespie on Gray Creek, June 3rd 1836." Another quaint-written verse in the front of the book reads as follows: "Don't any leaves abuse, as you me o'er peruse."

**Receivership For Cash Mill Settled**

Upon being informed that all collectible assets of the Cash Mills, of Gaffney, had been collected and the proceeds disbursed in accordance with previous orders of the court, Judge T. S. Sease at Spartanburg last week signed an order discharging Dr. W. C. Hamrick from the duties of receiver for the Cash Mills. The order was filed here Saturday in the office of Clerk of Court T. M. Caldwell.

Dr. Hamrick was appointed receiver about three years ago when the Cash Mills became involved in financial difficulties. Under court orders Dr. Hamrick sold the property at auction for \$300,000 in February, 1922, and since that time the plant has been operated as the Alma Mills with Dr. Hamrick as president.

Ed Baumgardner has just brought a few samples of the finest peaches, we ever saw anywhere in the world and they grew right over in Masculine Cove right plumb up in the elbow of the mountain where there are rocks as big as the house. Mr. Baumgardner says that he wants the Herald to know that he can raise other things as well as male calves and boys.

**32 Cars of Freight In 36 Hours is Record**

Ligon, local agent for the Southern, says he received 32 solid car loads of freight in 36 hours last week, establishing a new high record during his long service as agent for the Southern at this place.
