

GASTON TO PROHIBIT

Selling on Sunday

According to the terms of three bills drawn at the instance of Gaston's board of county commissioners, the promiscuous and unregulated sale of goods and merchandise, especially from so called "shacks" and eating places, on Sundays will be prohibited in Gaston county, carnivals, clairvoyants and palmists will be barred from the county and swimming pools in the county will hereafter be subjected to regulation and license.

The bills embodying the above provisions have been sent to Gaston's representatives in the General assembly with the approval of the county commissioners and it is expected that they will shortly be enacted into a law that will apply to Gaston county.

For some time there has been a strong sentiment in the county that here should be regulation of the three named institutions, particularly the sale of goods and merchandise on Sunday in certain quarters of Gaston county, and the appearance of carnivals, clairvoyants, palmists, etc., in the county.



Cline, in the presence of a number of relatives and intimate friends. The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. A. Cook of Polkville. The groom is a promising young medical student and the son of Dr. V. J. Palmer, a prominent physician of this county. The bride is one of Shelby's attractive young ladies and the Star tenders the happy couple its heartiest congratulations and good wishes."

Had Seven Teachers.

"The Shelby graded school opens Wednesday, September 4. Prof. F. H. Curtis is superintendent and he will be ably assisted by Misses Adelaide Gardner, Maggie Wood, Lonie Hendrick, Lillie Wray, Allie Noss and Jessie Eskridge. There will be a large enrollment to begin with this season."

UNIQUE EXPERIENCE
FOR JUDGE WEBB

In September Will Hold First Term Of Court In Home Town Of Shelby.

Charlotte News.

With the expected return of Federal Judge E. Yates Webb of Shelby in the next few days from a tour of Europe, the officers and attendants of Federal courts in six western cities and towns of North Carolina, including Charlotte, are getting ready for the Fall terms of U. S. courts.

Judge Webb is expected to land in New York this week from his European tour and is to come directly home and make ready for opening a special term of Federal court for civil cases at Asheville September 8th.

Following the special term at Asheville, Judge Webb will have one of the unique experiences of his career in opening a new Federal court term, authorized by special act of the last Congress, in his home town, Shelby, from which place he went each year to Washington over a period of 16 years as congressman from the Ninth North Carolina district and where he used to practice law, entering upon this profession shortly after his 21st birthday.

The new U. S. Court term at Shelby will be opened by Judge Webb Monday, September 22nd. The next U. S. court in the western district of North Carolina will convene at Charlotte on the first Monday in October. This will be followed by a one-week court at Statesville on the third Monday in October and by another one-week term at Salisbury on the fourth Monday in October. On the first Monday in November Judge Webb will open court in Asheville, on the fourth Monday in November he will convene a court in Wilkesboro and on the first Monday in December he will open court at Greensboro.

The new U. S. court at Shelby was created at the suggestion of U. S. Attorney Harlan M. Stone by special act of the last Congress near the close of the session, as a means of relieving the congestion of courts at Charlotte and Asheville. These two courts during the past year or two have had crowded dockets, due largely to the great number of violation of the National Prohibition Act. Both Charlotte and Asheville had record courts, so far as the number of cases was concerned, last Spring.

The creation of the new court at Shelby takes away from the docket of the Charlotte court the Federal cases originating in Cleveland, Lincoln, and a part of Gaston Counties. The creation of the new court also makes a change in the western district courts by shifting cases that formerly originated in Rutherford County to the Asheville Court instead of to the Charlotte court.

DAVIS WILL BE INVITED TO BIG CAROLINAS SHOW

Senator Simmons will invite John W. Davis to Charlotte for the Made-in-Carolinas exposition to speak "to the people of the Carolinas some day between September 22 and October 4."

In a letter to Mr. Simmons, J. C. Patton, executive secretary said: "As you may know, our people in the Carolinas are very anxious to have the distinguished nominee of the Democratic party visit them during the campaign and our board feels that there is no more fitting place or occasion than at the exposition where all the Carolinians are celebrating their industrial growth and success."

"We recall your promise to us on February 23 to visit the exposition yourself this year, since illness prevented you being present last year. It is a great pleasure to say to you that the textile feature alone this year gives the exposition almost national prominence."

"We are going to expect you, and we hope that through your influence we may have an acceptance of our invitation to Mr. Davis."


