WACO ENROLLMENT ON AN INCREASE

Attendance Now Beyond 150 Mark. Formal Welcome for Teachers on Friday Evening.

(Special to The Star.) Waco, Sept. 10.—The enrollment of the Waco high school, which began its fall session Monday, Sept. 1, has now gone beyond the 150 mark. This is 50 more than last year at the same time.

He stated that only a small percent of those boys and girls who come from without the district and here-to-fore have got started late, have been able to cover a grade in a year, because of a late start.
