

**Will Treat Chicago Youths Like Others**

Stephen F. Leonard and Richard Lee will receive exactly the same treatment accorded any other prisoner in the state prison at Joliet, Warden John L. Whiteman said after plans for receiving the youths were completed.

"There will be no side door or back-

way entrance for Loeb and Leopold," the warden said. "They will enter the front door the same as any other prisoner, passing through the corridor and then into the guard hall. Here they will find they are under prison discipline."

They will begin to expiate their crime a few moments after they pass into the grim gray stone structure which houses more than 2,000 prisoners. In the guard hall inside the

corridor a record clerk will receive the mittimus for the slayers and will give the officers in charge of them a receipt for the prisoners. Then the youths will be led through another corridor across the yard and into a building to be photographed in civilian attire. Here they will be assigned numbers. After being photographed they will be given a bath and then will be led to the prison barber for a shave and haircut.

The boys will not lose their shik hair cuts, Warden Whiteman said, but added that the slayers will have to be satisfied with a modified form of haircut.

"We no longer crop the hair of prisoners," the warden said, "but neither do we allow any freak hair-cuts."

Their first night in prison will be spent in "court cellars" and it is in "court cellars" that they will first be separated, possibly never to meet or speak to one another again for years, although under the roof of the

same institution.

"Court solitary" is a remnant of an old statute providing that each prisoner must spend his first day and one day in each year in solitary confinement. The youths will be placed in separate rooms for their first night here.

The boys will be assigned to manual labor of some kind, the warden said. The prison conducts shoe shops, furniture shops, rattan shops, a stone quarry, a machine shop and smaller shops. In one of these shops the boys will be put to work.

"They will have no office work at the start," Warden Whiteman said. "New prisoners are often spoiled by being given office positions. They do not learn to adapt themselves to prison life. That is the real essential, and that is why Loeb and Leopold will be put at some kind of manual labor when we find to what they are best adapted."

**Cotton Blight Disease Will Not Rot Bolls**

Disease Which Is Prevalent With Cotton Is Not Injurious To The Bolls.

A disease known as cotton blight which first appeared in the cotton fields of North Carolina in early July and which is now appearing again in many fields will not rot the bolls according to tests made by Dr. F. A. Wolf, plant disease investigator for the State College Experiment Station.

Dr. Wolf says that this disease appeared in epidemic form in certain parts of the State, especially in eastern Carolina, in early July and gave growers much concern at that time. It caused heavy shedding of the leaves and in some cases the tops of the plants rotted off. At that time, Dr. Wolf predicted that the trouble would end and the plants would recover quickly with the advent of clear warm days.

"Such was the case," says Dr. Wolf, "but the disease is now appearing again in its late season form. We find that it is now very abundant and many inquiries have been received at this office relative to the trouble. It appears as a form of leaf spot recognized by large, grayish brown spots with concentric markings. The affected tissues readily fall away making large openings or notches in the leaves.

"We find that the blight will not spread to the bolls and cause them to rot as many farmers seem to think. Our field observations indicate that the mature bolls will not be affected. However, any cotton grower who wants the disease identified can send us in specimens and we will be glad to write him in detail about the trouble."

Specimens addressed to Dr. F. A. Wolf, Plant Pathologist, State College Station, Raleigh, will receive prompt attention.

**Cole L. Blease Is Conceded Victory**

Columbia, S. C., Sept. 12.—Coleman L. Blease, twice governor and conceded to be the most picturesque political leader in the state since Pietenfork Ben Tillman, will be the junior senator from South Carolina for the next six years.

James F. Byrnes, representative in Congress from the second district for the last 14 years, today issued a statement accepting defeat in the Democratic run-off primary of Tuesday in which, according to latest returns, he ran second to the former governor by 2,314 votes out of a total of 198,000 tabulated. It was the closest senatorial race in this state for more than 20 years, state historical records show.

Efforts to locate Mr. Blease both at his home and office were unavailing early today. Although the returns have shown him in the lead since the night of the primary his margin was so close that he would make no statement for publication, saying he preferred to wait until it was definitely settled that he was the nominee of the party.

Elected to the state house of representatives from Newberry county in 1890 when he was just 22 years of age, Mr. Blease has been active in politics since that time. He has been a candidate for office at every election with the exception of 1920 since 1888.
