

Wars in which the United States has taken part since 1790, exclusive of the World war, have cost the nation more than \$6,836,000,000 in pensions. Pensions for the civil war totalled about \$6,427,000,000, it was shown in figures announced today by the interior department, while those growing out of the Indian wars amounted to \$25,000,000. Pensions for other wars included \$46,000,000 for the War of 1812, \$70,000,000 for the War of the revolution, \$56,000,000 for the Mexican war and \$126,000,000 for the war with Spain.
