Hens Worth Over Two Dollars Year Each

E. A. Hamrick Gets 1,038 Eggs From Six Pullets in Year, 123 Eggs in March Alone.

E. A. Hamrick, of Shelby route 4, has six Rhode Island pullets that are quite a boost for the poultry game in Cleveland county. In 1924 these six pullets laid 1,038 eggs, or about 90 eggs each month for an average.

Mr. Hamrick, who does not keep a roster, kept strict account of the eggs he received, and says that the total cost for the six pullets was \$12 and that from the sale of eggs he realized \$25.25—the average price for 86 1/2 dozen, which would leave a profit of \$13.25.

The number of eggs received from the six pullets each month follows: January 100; February, 75; March 123; April 117; May 111; June, 92; July, 86; August, 88; September, 81; October 75; November 46; December, 43. Total 1,038.
