Agents May Search Cars Without Papers

Washington, March 2.—Federal prohibition agents lawfully may stop automobiles and other vehicles and search them for contraband liquor without a warrant, the supreme court

decided today in a case from Michigan, brought by George Carroll and John Kiro.

In another liquor case, brought from Georgia by Sig Samuels, the court held that states under the constitution would make unlawful the possession of liquor acquired legally before enactment of the federal prohibition act.

Chief Justice Taft delivered the opinions in both cases, Justice McReynolds and Sutherland dissenting in the former, and Justice Butler in the latter.

Declaring that "it would be intolerable and unreasonable if a prohibition agent were authorized to stop every automobile on the chance of finding liquor," Chief Justice Taft asserted that "these lawfully within the country entitled to use the public highways have a right to free passage without interruption or search unless there is known to a competent official authorized to search, probable cause for believing that their vehicles are carrying contraband or illegal merchandise."
