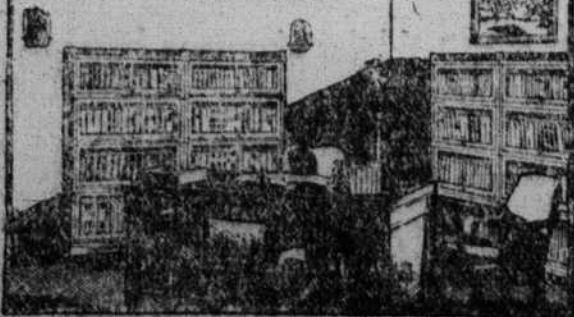

**Last Grandchild  
 Of Drury Dobbins**

(Special to The Star.)

In the passing of Mr. D. B. Harrill of Ellenboro, a few weeks ago, death removed a landmark of that section of the country. He was the last grandchild of the Rev. Drury Dobbins, the pioneer Baptist preacher in the section of the country. His mother was Artemesia Dobbins, only child of Rev. Drury Dobbins. His father was Richard Harrill of Rutherford county. "Uncle Dave" as he was called by all in and around Ellenboro, was the youngest of 12 children of Artemesia Dobbins and Richard Harrill.

He was born May 1st, 1924—died April 7th 1925. Was married to Miss Fannie Martin a most estimable woman in 1924. To this union six children were born, all girls. Four living, two dead. His wife died September 17th, 1917.

He enlisted in the war between the states 1865, served until 1865, was 2nd lieutenant of Co., B. 34th regiment of N. C. troop. He was under Capt. John Edwards, who died and W. P. Beam was appointed to fill Capt. Edwards' place. He took great interest and pleasure in the old soldier's dinners, and came regularly to Shelby to attend same. For the past three years he was unable to attend the dinners. One by one the old soldiers are passing away.

He was a man of decision. Here is a little incident that occurred when he joined the Baptist church at Bethel. He did not join the church until late in life. There was a revival in the church at Bethel—the last sermon had closed, the candidates for baptism and part of the congregation were ready to go to the place of baptism. "Uncle" Dave told the pastor to "wait a few minutes"—he went forward and united with the church. He said he was ready for baptism. When inquiry was made in regard to his clothes for baptism, he said the suit he was wearing was sufficient—he went down into the water without changing clothes, when he came out of the water it was found that he had a bill book in his pocket containing several hundred dollars of notes and money—notes and money were not damaged by water.

Uncle Dave was a friend to man. It might be said of him that "he lived by the side of the road and loved his fellow man". He was well known to travelers on the Seaboard that stopped at Ellenboro. He was fond of meeting the trains as they came in and out. He could have stayed on his porch, watched the trains, as they stopped, but he preferred to go out and have a word with the passengers and the train crew. He met these trains for 30 years, and was well known from Rutherfordton to Wilmington, and was called "Uncle Dave" by all.

He was noted for his hospitality—loved company. He would have the stockholders of Henrietta mills (of which he was one), dine with him, even when dinner was prepared for them at Henrietta.

He was a kind father. Was a man of sterling qualities—did much for his church, school and community. A noble man has passed away, he will long be remembered in the community where his name has been a household word.

**Once Wealthy Farmer  
 Dies A Pauper**

Raleigh, May 7.—In a bare home-made coffin drawn in a plain milk wagon the body of S. Hines Scarborough, once prosperous farmer of the Rolesville section who was stripped of more than \$80,000 by wildcat stock salesmen, was carried from the home of his grandson to the Rolesville Baptist church yesterday afternoon. Death prevented Scarborough from accepting admittance which was granted him Monday to the Wake county poor house.

At the Rolesville Baptist church Rev. W. R. Cullom preached the funeral sermon and stated that before the day when the clever young men came to snatch all Hines Scarborough's wealth with bright promises, he had drawn Scarborough's will which left the bulk of his estate of 1,100 acres of fine farm land and thousands of dollars to the Baptist home and foreign missions.

From the church to the family burying ground the rough casket, which Scarborough had his nephew, Frank Scarborough, make for him last fall, was carried in a hearse which was sent from Wake Forest by T. E. Holding. A large crowd of relatives and friends attended the funeral.

Scarborough, according to relatives had been completely cured for a cancer from which he was suffering at the time when he was induced to sign notes for wildcat stock. He died of kidney trouble from which he has been suffering recently.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Latta Rogers, one brother, Jeff Scarborough, one sister, Mrs. Stell, and several grandchildren all living in the Rolesville section.

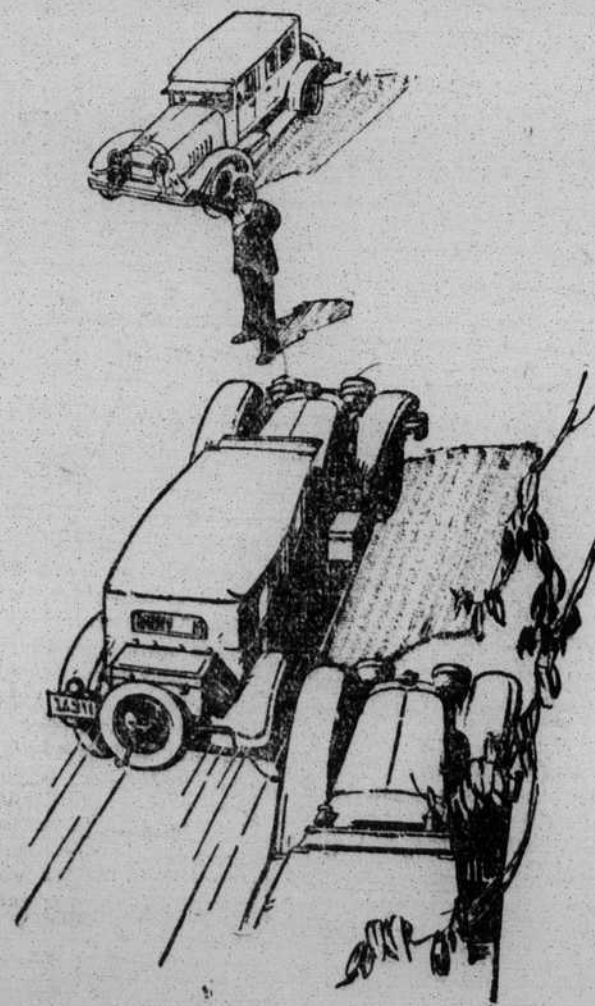
