

He was well known to travelers on the Seaboard that stopped at Ellenboro. He was fond of meeting the trains as they came in and out. He could have stayed on his porch, watched the trains, as they stopped, but he preferred to go out and have a word with the passengers and the train crew. He met these trains for 30 years, and was well known from Rutherfordton to Wilmington, and was called "Uncle Dave" by all.

He was noted for his hospitalityloved company. He would have the stockholders of Henrietta mills (of which he was one), dine with him, even when dinner was prepared for hem at Henrietta. He was a kind father. Was a man of sterling qualities -did much for his church, school and community. A noble man has passed away, he will ong be remembered in the communty where his name has been a house hold word.

Hines Scarboro, nce prosperous farmer of the Roles. ville section who was stripped of more than \$80,000 by wildcat stock salesaten, was carried from the home of his grandson to the Rolesville Baptist burch yesterday afternoon. 
Rev. W. R. Cullom preached the funeral sermon and stated that before the day when the clever young men came to snatch all Hines Scarboro's wealth with bright promises, he had drawn Scarboro's will which left the bulk of his estate of 1,100 acres of fine ferm land and thousands of dollars to the Baptist home and foreign missions. From the church to the family buryng ground the rough casket, which Scarboro had his nephew, Frank Scarboro, make for him last fall, was carried in a hearse which was sent from Wake Forest by T. E. Holding, A large crowd of relatives and friends attended the funeral.

Scarboro, according to relatives had been completely cured for a cancer from which he was suffering at the time when he was induced to sign notes for wildcat stock. He died of kidney trouble from which he has been suffering recently.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Latna Rogers, one brother, Jeff Scarboro, one sister, Mrs. Stell, and several grandchildren all living in the Rolesville section.
