Burke Pageant Is Thrilling Spectacle

Morganton, May 22.—With the wooded slopes of the beautiful grounds of the State School for the Deaf, which form a natural amphitheater, as a setting, and between seven and eight hundred young people participating the outstanding events in Burke county history, was presented here tonight. Ideal weather conditions brought thousands to witness the performance, hundreds of them coming from quite a distance.

Opening with an interpretation of what Burke was even before the time of the Indians, when its only inhabitants were the flowers, butterflies, fairies and birds, and extending through all the stages to the present, the curtain of the past was drawn and the spectators allowed to witness a portrayal of many thrilling scenes in Burke's history.

Weaving together the different episodes, a group of beautiful girls, dressed to represent water sprites, interpreted the influence wielded by the Catawba river, "The Spirit of Catawba," Miss Susan Graham Erwin leading a series of graceful aesthetic dances. Memorable scenes presented showed the coming of the Greenlees, early settlers in the county. The trial of John Sevier, the council in Quaker Meadows before the battle of Kings Mountain, the wedding of Governor Vance which occurred near Morganton, the civil war and world war periods.

In the finale a feature was the appearance of General Manager R. E. Simpson, of the Southern Railway system, a native of this county, who began his notable railroad career as water boy on a section at Glen Alps.

SCHOOL AT KNOB CREEK PLANS CONSOLIDATION

The committeemen of the above mentioned district and many interesting patrons therein says County Superintendent Newton. "The representatives present at this gathering were unanimous in their approval and desire for a big consolidated school. The meeting was evidence of an ever growing sentiment for the larger and better type of schools. Consolidation in Cleveland county is rapidly gaining momentum and it can be assumed that within the next three or four years, the full county-wide plan will be put into operation. The purpose of the plan is to equalize educational opportunities for all children, no matter how remote they may live from their school."

Two Other Modifications. Another meeting will be held in the court house on the first Monday in June, two other meetings are to be held in the court house auditorium with a view to modifying the county-wide plan as relating to the schools of No. 5 and No. 8 townships. At some future date, in accordance with this plan, all the schools of No. 5 township exclusive of Plonks school, are to be consolidated with Waco—a state accredited high school, says Mr. Newton.

"The board proposes to present this matter at this meeting to all the committeemen and interested patrons affected hereby and after a full and free discussion, modify if deemed wise, the county-wide plan so as to permit the consolidation of all two or more districts. This does not grant those districts remaining outside the privilege of affecting other consolidations relating to this township. Eventually all of these schools, must become a part of the Waco school and the people of No. 5 township are justly entitled to be proud of Waco as a township high school, according to the school authorities. But few townships in the county can boast of a high school on the state accredited list. It would seem that in the end, if not now, all the schools of No. 5 township and will want to be a part of the Waco district."

"The state is not only accrediting high schools today, but the elementary schools are likewise being placed on the standard list after the fulfillment of certain conditions. The state therefore, makes no loan for any school building erected that contains less than seven rooms in that it requires 7 teachers teaching 7 grades before any elementary school can be standardized. Leaders in education have long since realized that small elementary schools do not provide training sufficiently thorough to equip the pupils for entrance into high school and it is but natural that the foundation work should be strong and effective in order that the super-structure might attain the utmost of strength."

"Another meeting will be held for No. 8 township at 3:30 Monday June 1 in the court house with a view to modifying the county-wide plan if deemed wise as relating to the schools of No. 8 township, exclusive of New House. It is proposed to modify the plan so as to consolidate Union, Fairview and Delight into one big school, or either build a state high school to be located at Polkville and retain an elementary school at Union. The latter plan would involve the erection of an 8 or 10 room high school building at Polkville and the erection of a six room elementary building at Union. It is estimated that the two buildings fully equipped would cost from \$45,000 to \$50,000."
