Paving Contract To Be Awarded Soon

Gaffney to Thickety on National Highway. Will Complete Two-Thirds Distance Gaffney-Spartanburg.

The contract for paving the National highway from Gaffney to Thickety, a distance of about five miles, will probably be let in August, it has been announced here following the return to Gaffney of a delegation that conferred with Chief Highway Commissioner Samuel McGowan in Columbia. The local delegation included Senator T. B. Butler, County Highway Engineer C. W. Wannamaker and C. M. Smith, banker.

Definite agreement was reached for Cherokee county to provide \$75,000 to be matched by an equal sum of federal aid, making a total of \$150,000 for the work.

Cherokee county was promised reimbursement of \$35,000 in 1927 and the remaining \$40,000 of the county's \$75,000 by 1930, according to Mr. Wannamaker.

Commissioner McGowan suggested that the contract be let August 7, but this date is tentative depending upon the completion of data relating to the project by the state highway department engineers. The route was surveyed several weeks ago.

Mr. Wannamaker expressed the opinion that the contract will be let by the middle of August at the latest, and that work probably will be started by September 1.

When this section is completed two-thirds of the distance between Gaffney and Spartanburg will be hard-surfaced. Mr. Wannamaker said the present plans of the highway department contemplate having the entire route paved by 1930.

Lincoln county's candidate is one of four avowed candidates for the solicitorship, the other three being Attorney Joe Murphy of Catawba; S. J. Erwin, jr., of Burke, and Attorney Spurling, of Caldwell.

ORDERS REMOVAL OF SIGNS FROM HIGHWAYS

Columbia, S. C., July 13.—Removal of all advertising signs from the sides of state highways has been ordered by Chief Highway Commissioner Samuel McGowan. Mr. McGowan has instructed the inspectors for the highway department to remove the signs and road forces have been given similar orders.

The chief commissioner has ordered signs removed from within a 10-foot distance from the highways.

Beauty and safety are sought by this move. The multiplicity of signs conflicts with the state's safety signals, Mr. McGowan says.

TOM DIXON TALKS EVOLUTION TRIAL

Would Be Disgrace to Country, He Says. On Visit to His Old Shelby Home.

Raleigh (Greensboro News dispatch)—Thomas Dixon's statement to day that evolution has nothing to do with religion recalls to local observers of religious phenomena the radical differences between North Carolina playwright and novelist and his senior brother, Amzi Clarence Dixon, prince of the fundamentalists.

Clarence Dixon died a few days ago. The Baltimore Sun, in the city where the big North Carolinian preached, paid tribute to the senior Dixon as a great fighter and a faithful believer in what he professed. Only a few days before Clarence Dixon died, Frank Dixon suddenly passed. The two tragic events brought the old Shelby boy back to North Carolina.

"The attempt on Mr. Bryan's part to fix a standard for ignorance for our country is, to say the least, amusing," said Dr. Dixon. "If the situation were taken seriously," he added, "it would be a disgrace to the United States." "My personal view is that evolution has nothing whatever to do with religion, any more than astronomy or geology. If we stop teaching evolution, then let's stop teaching as-

tronomy and geology. "Evolution is nothing more nor less than a scientific hypothesis as to how God created man in his own image. It makes no difference whether it took five ten million years or whether he took some mud and atrowel and made man and then set him up by a fence to dry in the sun."

Dr. Dixon was en route to his old home in Shelby by motor. He joined Mrs. Dixon in Raleigh. She had been in Florida.

While here Dixon was asked about the story that he preached on an earthquake the night of the famous Charleston catastrophe which had visible effects here.

"No," he answered, "not exactly." "That was in the early days of my ministry. Mr. N. B. Broughton had asked me to conduct a series of meetings at the Tabernacle Baptist church. On that particular night I preached a very vivid sermon on "Dab." By the time I got home, the earthquake had occurred and my chimney had been partly shaken down."

"So you had a big crowd the next night" he was asked.

In the old days Tom Dixon and his elder brother used to mix it with Robert G. Ingersoll. The senior thought the colonel the head of a great hierarchy of helians. Tom Dixon thanked him for stabbing to death many a cruel lie told on the Christian religion. It is not strange therefore that the genius of the family, Tom Dixon, should have been led into the modernist camp while the elder brother led the fundamentalists.

License Schedule For Town Of Shelby, N. C.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

CITY TOWN OF SHELBY.

COUNTY OF CLEVELAND.

THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF SHELBY DO ENACT: SECTION 1.—That to raise funds for the general municipal purposes the following license taxes hereinafter specified are hereby levied for the privilege of carrying on the businesses, trades, professions, callings, occupations, or doing the acts named within the corporate limits of the town of Shelby from the first day of June, 1925, to the 31st day of May, 1926, unless for some other time or period hereinafter specified; and all such taxes shall be some other time or period hereinafter specified; and all such taxes shall be due and payable in advance. The payment of any particular tax herein imposed shall not relieve the party paying same from liability for any other tax specifically imposed or any other business conducted by such person. The Chief of Police of the town of Shelby is hereby appointed, designated and authorized to receive and collect all license taxes and issue the licenses therefor.

SECTION 2.—That all persons before engaging in any business, trade, profession, calling, occupation, or doing any act on which a license tax is imposed by this ordinance shall apply in writing to the Chief of Police of the town of Shelby for a license and upon the payment of a license tax herein imposed a license shall be issued to said applicant. Such license must be posted conspicuously in the place of business licensed; or, if such license has no regular place of business, said license must be kept at a place where it may be regularly inspected by the Chief of Police of Shelby. A license may be refused if the Chief of Police or the Board of Aldermen is not satisfied that the applicant is a person of good moral character and is a fit and proper person to conduct such business, and also satisfied that the place proposed is a suitable place for the conduct of such business.

SECTION 3.—That when any business is begun after June 1, 1925, the tax in such case may be reduced in proportion to the number of full quarters that have elapsed since June 1, 1925, unless otherwise provided in the section fixing the tax. The adoption of this schedule for license taxes shall not abridge the right of the Board of Aldermen to change, alter, increase or decrease any or all of the license taxes herein levied, or to levy taxes on businesses, trades or professions not herein taxed, at any time.

SECTION 4.—Separate license shall be required for each place of business.

SECTION 5.—Any license issued under this ordinance shall be subject to revocation or suspension for a definite or indefinite time by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Shelby.

SECTION 6.—That each owner of any vehicle, private or for hire, public or for hire, for which license is required, shall display on such vehicle a metallic sign to be furnished by the town. Upon satisfactory proof that any such metallic sign or tag has been lost or destroyed, the Chief of Police shall furnish a duplicate upon payment of a fee of \$1.

SECTION 7.—That every person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this ordinance or carry on any business, trade, vocation or profession on which a license tax has been fixed, without having first paid the tax and received the license, shall be liable to a penalty of \$50 for each offense, and each day said business shall be carried on shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 8.—All license taxes imposed by this ordinance shall be due and payable in advance, and if any person shall fail to pay any license tax required by this ordinance on or before the 1st day of August, 1925, five per cent of the amount of such tax shall be added for each month thereafter, and no license shall be issued until the tax plus the per cent shall be paid. The addition of the said percent on the amount of said license tax shall not exempt the delinquent from the penalties herein prescribed in case of delinquency.

LICENSE SCHEDULE

SECTION 9.—That on all trades, professions, callings, occupations or businesses conducted within the town of Shelby, on which a maximum license tax, to be levied by towns and cities, is fixed by the Revenue and Machinery Acts of the General Assembly of North Carolina, session of 1925, the maximum license taxes applicable to cities and towns of the population of Shelby pursuant to said State Revenue and Machinery Act, are hereby fixed and levied as such taxes for the town of Shelby.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.
